

What are your hours of operation?

We are closed all legal county holidays and Memorial Day week

Which taxes do I pay to your office?

At the Northampton tax office, we are responsible for collecting taxes for three taxing authorities:

- 1. <u>Council Rock School District</u> Real Estate & Northampton Township Occupational (OCC)
- 2. Northampton Township Real Estate & Refuse Fee
- 3. Bucks County Real Estate Taxes

Who Collects the Earned Income Tax?

Keystone Collection Group (866-539-1100) is contracted to collect the 1% Earned Income Tax (EIT). Most people have their EIT withheld from their paycheck. You should make sure that your employer has the correct political sub division (PSD) code and that the PSD code on your W-2 matches that of Council Rock; the PSD code for Council Rock is 090603.

How do I change the name on my deed?

The Bucks County Recorder of Deeds (215-348-6209) can assist you. They will need your request in writing and for you to provide proper legal documentation sent to: Bucks County Recorder of Deeds, 55 E. Court Street Doylestown, PA 18901. Please get professional advice first.

What is the office's mailing address and can we pay in person?

Northampton Township Police Traffic Safety Unit

The Northampton Township Police Department's Traffic Safety Unit is responsible for investigating serious and fatal crashes, traffic studies, targeted enforcement of traffic regulations, deploying digital speed displays and message boards throughout the township, and responding to citizen's traffic concerns. The Traffic Safety Unit includes certified Crash Reconstructionists and other Officers who are dedicated to making our roads as safe as possible, educating motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians.

Whenever there is a crash that involves a possible fatality or serious bodily injury, the Traffic Safety Unit will respond to investigate. The members of this unit have specialized training in collection of evidence on the roadway and utilize digital diagraming equipment in order to find out what happened in a crash sequence.

The Traffic Safety Unit responds to all written citizen traffic concerns. Often, a roadway survey is conducted to determine if the road is safe or if changes to the roadway, signage, or new regulations are needed. Some of the most common citizen traffic concerns involve complaints about speeding vehicles and stop sign violations. Northampton Township Police do not pick areas to conduct traffic enforcement details for the sole purpose of writing citations to motorists. The locations that traffic enforcement details are conducted are often a result of a citizen traffic concern or an area where traffic enforcement will likely help prevent accidents.

TRAFFIC SAFETY TIPS from our unit:

- Distracted driving is illegal and the cause of many serious crashes. If your attention is needed elsewhere, safely pull over until you can give your full attention to the road.
- Be responsible when using crosswalks:
 - Pedestrians must cross in designated crosswalks. Motor vehicles must give the right-of-way to pedestrians in a crosswalk.
 - You must walk your bicycle in a crosswalk. You do not have the same right-of-way as a pedestrian if riding a bicycle.
 - Keep in mind, if you enter the road when not in a crosswalk, the motor vehicle has the right-of-way.
- Always keep a safe distance between you and the vehicle in front of you.
- It is the driver's responsibility to drive at a safe and appropriate speed for any given conditions. This includes reducing your speed during bad weather (rain, sleet, snow), for backed-up or slow traffic, and to safely negotiate a curve in the roadway.

Safety on the roadway starts with the individual motorist, bicyclist, and pedestrian. It is up to everyone to act responsibly and follow the rules of the road.

From the Building and Codes Department...

In 2008, the Pennsylvania Legislature passed the Home Improvement Consumer Protection Act (HICPA). The law requires that all contractors who perform at least \$5,000 worth of home improvements per year to register with the Attorney General's Office.

Before choosing a contractor, it is recommended that you verify registration with the Attorney General's office. You can visit their website at www.attorneygeneral.gov where you can verify registration on the Registered Contractors section.

According to the Attorney General, "registration under HICPA in not an endorsement, recommendation or approval by the Office of Attorney General of the contractor's competency or skill."

For this reason, in addition to seeing whether a contractor is registered with the Attorney General's Office, you should also:

- 1. Thoroughly check your contractor's references.
- 2. Obtain more than one bid for the job.
- 3. Check for complaints filed with the Better Business Bureau.

Consumers or businesses can call the Home Improvement Registration Helpline at 1-888-520-6680 to report unregistered contractors operating in their communities. Complaints about unregistered contractors can also be emailed to their office at: hic@attorneygeneral.gov.

Working Together

Senator Farry, and State Reps. Hogan and Marcell sponsored joint state services events featuring PA State Treasurer Garrity. As part of each event, constituents were able to search onsite for unclaimed property, recovering over \$200,000 owed to those in attendance.

Unclaimed property can include things like dormant bank accounts, uncashed checks, forgotten stocks, insurance policies, and more. State law requires businesses to report unclaimed property to Treasury after three years of dormancy. The average value of a claim is \$1,600.

It's a Burning Issue. From the Fire Marshal's Office

It's that time of year when we think about getting back outside and enjoying our yards and patios. Perhaps you have a fire pit or outdoor fireplace? If so, please be aware that the smoke from your fire may not be welcomed by your neighbor. Fire pits should be operated under their manufacturer's recommendations and common sense. A suitable means of extinguishment must be on hand, and the fire must be constantly attended until extinguished. Residents are reminded that open burning (other than recreational fires) is prohibited in Northampton Township. A Reminder from the Fire Department When Using Your Outdoor Grill



SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use.

- Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.

- 333 Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- In Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.

Have fuel-burning heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in. When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation. Never use your oven to heat your home.

- A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time.
- In 2005, U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated 61,100 nonfire CO incidents in which carbon monoxide was found, or an average of seven calls per hour.

HOW TO AVOID A SCAM

FOUT SIGNS THAT IT'S A SCAM

Scammers PRETEND to be from an organization you know. Scammers often pretend to be contacting you on behalf of the government. They might use a real name, like the Social Security Administration, the IRS, or Medicare, or make up a name that sounds official. Some pretend to be from a business you know, like a utility company, a tech company, or even a charity asking for donations. They use technology to change the phone number that appears on your caller ID. So the name and number you see might not be real.

Scammers say there's a PROBLEM or a PRIZE. They might say you're in trouble with the government. Or you owe money. Or someone in your family had an emergency. Or that there's a virus on your computer. Some scammers say there's a problem with one of your accounts and that you need to verify some information. Others will lie and say you won money in a lottery or sweepstakes but have to pay a fee to get it.

Scammers PRESSURE you to act immediately. Scammers want you to act before you have time to think. If you're on the phone, they might tell you not to hang up so you can't check out their story. They might threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your driver's or business license, or deport you. They might say your computer is about to be corrupted.

Scammers tell you to PAY in a specific way. They often insist that you pay by sending money through a money transfer company or by putting money on a gift card and then giving them the number on the back. Some will send you a check (that will later turn out to be fake), tell you to deposit it, and then send them money.

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO AVOID A SCAM

Block unwanted calls and text messages. Take steps to block unwanted calls and to filter unwanted text messages.

Don't give your personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect. Legitimate organizations won't call, email, or text to ask for your personal information, such as your Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers. If you get an email or text message from a company you do business with and you think it's real, it's still best not to click on any links. Instead, contact them using a website you know is trustworthy. Or look up their phone number. Don't call a number they gave you or the number from your caller ID.

Resist the pressure to act immediately. Legitimate businesses will give you time to make a decision. Anyone who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is a scammer.

T • Know how scammers tell you to pay. Never pay someone who insists you pay with a gift card or by using a money transfer service. And never deposit a check and send money back to someone.

• Stop and talk to someone you trust. Before you do anything else, tell someone — a friend, a family member, a neighbor — what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.

Playground Safety ... A quick checklist for parents

Before your children head out the door for the playground, check that:



Supervision is present, but strings and ropes aren't.

Adult presence is needed to watch for potential hazards, observe, intercede and facilitate play when necessary. Strings on clothing or ropes used for play can cause accidental strangulation if caught on equipment.

All children play on age-appropriate equipment.

Preschoolers, ages 2-5, and children ages 5-12, are developmentally different and need different equipment located in separate areas to keep the playground safe and fun for all.



Nearly 70 percent of all playground injuries are related to falls to the surface. Acceptable surfaces include hardwood fiber/mulch, pea gravel, sand and synthetic materials such as poured-in-place, rubber mats or tiles. Playgrounds surfaces should not be concrete, asphalt, grass, blacktop, packed dirt or rocks.



Equipment is safe.

Check to make sure the equipment is anchored safely in the ground, all equipment pieces are in good working order, S-hooks are entirely closed, bolts are not protruding, there are no exposed footings, etc.

SELECTING AGE-APPROPRIATE EQUIPMENT

AGES: 6 MOS. - 23 MOS.

Play areas for children 6 months through 23 months should offer places where children can have space to move and explore. Appropriate play areas for this group should provide places to crawl, stand, and walk.

AGES: 2-5 YEARS

Appropriate play areas for children ages 2-5 could include: areas to crawl; low platforms with multiple access such as ramps and ladders; ramps with pieces attached for grasping; low tables for sand, water and manipulation of materials; tricycle paths with various textures; flexible spring rockers; sand areas with covers; and shorter slides (usually no taller than 4 feet).

AGES: 5-12 YEARS

Developmentally appropriate play areas for school-age children could include: rope or chain climbers on angles; climbing pieces; horizontal bars; cooperative pieces such as tire swings, slides and sliding poles; and open spaces to run and play ball.

For as long as I can remember I always wanted to be a teacher. I did not have the best home life growing up and school was the only place that I felt safe and happy. My teachers always showed me so much love and compassion and I wanted to be just like them!"

Have you ever had a "proud teacher moment" that made your heart do a happy dance?

"One proud teacher moment I had was my first year of teaching preschool. I had a student really struggling with spelling and writing her first name. She had the fine motor skills to physically hold the pencil and write but she just could not remember the formation and order of the letters. We worked so hard on this every day she was in school. We used magnet letters, my iPad and apple pencil, shaving cream and her finger and paints. You name it, we tried it. One day, it just clicked! I gave her a writing strip and a marker and she wrote her first name. I could've cried!! She was so proud to show her Grandmom at pick-up that day and all the teachers celebrated her!"

How do you create a classroom vibe that's like a "warm hug" to your students?

"I think I do this by being authentic. I teach because I absolutely love it and I think kids can pick up quickly who cares about them. We also talk A LOT! We share our feelings, ideas, and experiences daily, and I do my best to foster conversations where everyone feels comfortable being themselves. At the preschool level this means a lot of modeling of kind words and responses and we end every single day with a literal warm hug!"

"I have been a co-teacher for 16 years. I am married and have three children. I started as a substitute teacher when my youngest daughter went to Northampton Township Preschool. I have since earned my CDA (Child Development Associate.) I enjoy working with the children and love doing crafts with them. Unfortunately, printing capability is not available in the app.

cloudLibrary has an e-magazine database as part of its great e-resource app. Named cLNewsstand, this e-magazine database is accessed via the free cloudLibrary app. Once in this app, scroll to the bottom of the home page and select the button labeled Magazines. If one uses a computer browser for cLNewsstand reading, library patrons must create a CL Newsstand account with an email and a password of your choice. Put in your country and library (Bucks County Free Library) and your library card and PIN. Whether in the app or in a browser, you are ready to read over 7,000 popular magazines in a variety of subject areas. In addition, read the magazines that are available in 30 different languages.

Important Dates in Northampton Township History:

January 28, 1954: The Worthington Mill Covered Bridge, built in the 1870s, was burned.

February 24, 1912: The White Bear Hotel at the SW corner of Second Street Pike & Almshouse Road was on fire.

May 5, 1775: Men met at Richard Leedom's Black Bear Tavern. Leedom would join the Fourth Association Company as a private under Captain Henry Lott.

April 1, 1686: English Quaker and Commissioner of State, Arthur Cook, was granted a 2,000-acre parcel of land. Part of that land would become known as the Cornell Farm.

March 4, 1681: William Penn received his charter for the colony of Pennsylvania.
