Dear Northampton Township Residents,

I am certain that when we think back to May, when it felt more like April, we were all convinced summer 2018 would never arrive. When was it not raining? Well summer has arrived and the warmer weather provides us with the opportunity to enjoy our Township parks. From children to seniors, parks provide a place where everyone can spend their leisure time to exercise, enjoy nature, play sports and participate in other activities at the parks.

Since 1985 America has celebrated July as the nation's official Park and Recreation Month. This may be the perfect time to inform you of all the opportunities that await you at our local township parks. Northampton Township is fortunate to have two large community parks that link to other parkland. The Municipal Park located on Hatboro and Bristol Roads in Churchville with close to 100 acres of parkland provides amenities that includes walking trails, softball and soccer fields, basketball courts, a hockey rink, Miracle League fields, picnic pavilions, a playground, an amphitheater and the Garden of Remembrance. This Park is host to many special events and sporting events including the Sounds of Summer Concert Series. The Recreation Complex on Newtown-Richboro Road in Richboro is comprised of the Recreation Center, where many recreation classes and camps are held year round as well as a playground, four lighted tennis courts, two lighted basketball courts and a number of soccer and baseball fields. A restroom facility and a walking trail which will provide a link to Tyler State Park will be constructed as part of the ongoing Civic Center Improvement Project. The additional interior park trails will provide a connection from downtown Richboro, through Tyler Park, to Bucks County Community College.

Whether on a state level like Tyler Park, where large tracts of land are set aside to preserve special places, or a local level, where smaller landscapes serve as recreation outlets for the local communities, parks are vitally important to all of us.

Significant evidence shows that access to parks increases exercise of those living close to the area and reduces many ailments such as heart disease, diabetes and depression. Visiting a park also increases one's mood, cultivating a healthy mind as well as body! People see parks as gathering places to meet with friends and family, and spaces to exercise and reconnect with nature. And it goes without saying that parks provide benefits for the environment. Park areas provide trees and vegetation that clean the air, water and landscape, and provide a valuable habitat for wildlife.

In a recent survey conducted by the National Recreation and Park Society, seven in ten Americans regularly visit their local park and recreation facilities. An even larger number—nine in ten—agrees that their communities benefit from everything their local park and recreation agencies offer. As always, this newsletter highlights upcoming events sponsored by our Parks and Recreation Department, be sure to check them out.

BASINS AND OPEN SPACE

Northampton Township owns more than 800 acres of land consisting of 85 basins, open space areas, traffic islands and road banks. To maintain all of these public spaces, we have a team of Public Works Employees that consist of one full time employee on a large mowing tractors and a trimming crew with one full time employee and six part time summer employees with trimming mowers and weed wackers. It takes two to three weeks to complete a full circuit of mowing of all these locations in the township.

While we do receive calls from time to time about our schedule, please keep in mind that when it rains we lose two or more days with each rain storm. Because basins exist to receive all the storm drain water, the basins cannot be mowed until this rain water is drained out of the storm water system. Therefore making mowing almost impossible to mow these basins for a few days.

Thank you for your patience and understanding as Township Staff do their best maintain these facilities.



JACKSONVILLE BRIDGE REOPENING



County Commissioner Charlie Martin and Board of Supervisors Vice Chairperson Eileen Silver, along with other County officials Cut Ribbon to Re-Open Bridge No. 358 on Old Jacksonville Rd. in Northampton Township.

On Friday, April 20, 2018, Commissioner Charles H. Martin represented Commissioner colleagues Robert G. Loughery and Diane M. Ellis-Marseglia, LCSW to cut the ribbon and re-open County Bridge No. 358 following a major rehabilitation project. Bridge No. 358 carries Old Jacksonville Rd. over the Little Neshaminy Creek in Northampton Township. The Township was represented during the event by Supervisor Eileen Silver. Bucks County Director of Operation Kevin Spencer also was on hand. The bridge was taken out of service during October, 2017 to perform the repairs.

Commissioner Martin as well as representatives from General Services and Northampton cut the ribbon to re-open Bridge #358."We are pleased to re-open this bridge for the residents of Northampton Township and the many motorists who use Old Jacksonville Rd.," Commissioner Martin said. "There is some beautiful scenery involved with this creek and the surrounding neighborhood. We will continue to rehabilitate our County owned bridges as needed through the remainder of 2018 and beyond."

Bridge No. 358 was built in 1933 and is a single-span, concrete encased steel I-Beam bridge with bituminous riding surface and stone masonry abutments. The bridge allows for one lane of traffic across and measures 22 feet long and 18 feet wide.

The comprehensive rehabilitation of the bridge consisted of the installation of approach guiderails at the four corners of the structure, concrete repairs to the beams and underside of the deck, stone masonry repairs and repointing of the abutments and wing walls, and milling and overlay pavement on the bridge and at the bridge approach ends to the end of the new guiderail. It also included installation of scour countermeasures along the abutment faces, and installation of epoxy coating to concrete parapet walls and the outside faces of concrete encasement of exterior beams.


Bridge #358 Construction Plaque. Professional Construction Contractors of Bethlehem, PA completed the construction, while engineering and design was done by Gilmore and Associates of New Britain, PA. The total bid cost for construction was \$591,747.10. Bridge No. 358 is one of 114 owned and maintained by the County of Bucks and its General Services division.

From the Building and Codes Department



We often receive inquiries from residents looking to add patios to their homes. As a result, we wanted to touch on the major items for your consideration.

First, from a zoning perspective, all patios are required to be constructed within the building envelope for your particular property. All properties are within a particular zoning district and each district has required front, rear, and side yard setbacks. In addition, each zoning district has a maximum permitted impervious

surface ratio, which is the amount of the lot that can be covered by paved and covered surfaces, such as the footprint of the house, driveway, walkways, and any proposed patio. As a result, this must be evaluated when considering location and size of your patio project.

From a building code perspective, patios must be at least two inches below the siding or below the top of the foundation wall if you have stucco. If there are steps, a three foot deep landing is also required. It is also important to make sure that the landings and steps have flashing behind them.

Finally, a permit is required to construct a new patio. Homeowners should coordinate with their contractors regarding who will submit the necessary forms to our office. If you have any questions, feel free to contact the Building and Codes Department at 215-355-3883. We'll be happy to answer any questions that you may have regarding your project.

Can You Hear your Smoke Detectors?

Wireless interconnected smoke detectors are battery powered and install like regular battery powered smoke detectors. They transmit signals to other detectors and don't require wires. With smoke detectors on each level and in each bedroom they form an effective fire alarm system that meets National Fire Protection Association requirements. Additional detectors are recommended in each separate room and in the basement.



Can you hear the smoke detectors making noise from anywhere in your home? Do you have enough detectors to provide sufficient coverage and early warning? Can you hear all the detectors when you are asleep?

- 1. Additional wireless smoke detectors can be added at any time.
- 2. Wireless detectors can transmit up to 200'. They offer the ability to include out buildings and detached garages into a home fire alarm system.
- 3. Wireless detectors are an ideal upgrade for older homes that do not have hardwired detectors.

TRASH, RECYCLING, AND YARD WASTE COLLECTION INFORMATION FOR NORTHAMPTON TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS

Per the Township contract with J. P. Mascaro & Sons, here are the "basics" of Trash, Recycling, and Yard Waste residential collection in our Township. RESIDENTIAL CURBSIDE COLLECTION OCCURS ONCE A WEEK. If you are unsure of your collection day please call us 215-357-6800.

HOLIDAY COLLECTION SCHEDULE: Only six holidays will affect your collection day: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. When a holiday occurs on a collection day, all collections throughout the township will be delayed for the reminder of the week by one day.

COLLECTION CANCELLATION DUE INCLEMENT WEATHER: Collection will occur during inclement weather unless cancelled by JP Mascaro. Cancellation Announcements will be posted on the Township's website and eNews alerts. All collections throughout the township will occur one day late for the reminder of the week if collection is cancelled by J.P. Mascaro. Sign up to receive Township eNews Alerts by visiting www.northamptontownship.com *Please note: if no weather-related cancellation was announced, you should place your trash and recyclables at the curb by 6:00 AM-the trash trucks will not be sent back to residences that did not place trash to curb on time.*

RESIDENTIAL HOUSEHOLD TRASH COLLECTION DETAILS

- All collection can begin as early as 6:00 AM. Trash, recyclables, and yard waste must be at the curb no later than 6:00 AM on your collection day and no earlier than 6:00 PM the night before your collection day. Do not put containers in front of your mailbox.
- Maximum of twelve trash bags or trash cans per week.
- Trash must be in suitable containers such as plastic trash bags or trash cans; do not use paper bags or cardboard boxes.
- Trash cans or bags when filled must weigh less than 50 pounds and be a minimum size of 20 gallons and a maximum size of 32 gallons.
- One bulk item per week is collected on the day of household trash collection. One bulk item would include any one of the following: one piece of household furniture, one appliance except any appliance containing Freon (see below), one car tire without rim, one mattress and box spring set, or 1-10 rolls of carpet which must be cut into 3-foot to 4-foot sections and rolled, tied or taped into manageable bundles. If you are unsure if your large item is acceptable for collection as a bulk item, please call us at 215-357-6800.
- Freon containing items such as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, and dehumidifiers are collected by appointment only. Please call J.P. Mascaro to schedule a pick-up; there is no charge for this service.
- Items that will not be collected include but are not limited to: building or demolition materials, concrete, dirt, stones, automotive
 parts, household hazardous waste, and "covered electronic devices" including televisions, computer monitors, computers and
 computer peripherals. Residents are responsible for proper disposal of these items. Hazardous Waste and Television/Covered
 Electronic Devise disposal information can be found at www.buckscounty.org/recycling

RESIDENTIAL SINGLE-STREAM RECYCLING COLLECTION

- Recyclable materials are collected by a separate truck on the same day as your household trash collection. Please use the green recycling toter or a container well-marked with recycling stickers, available free of charge from the township, for all acceptable single-stream recyclable materials.
- Single-stream recyclable materials include all paper, newspaper, cardboard boxes, magazines and catalogs, glass bottles and jars, aluminum or metal food and beverage containers, plastic food and beverage containers labelled #1-#7 on the bottom, and cardboard cartons.
- Recycling toters containing unacceptable materials will not be collected. Unacceptable materials
 include but are not limited to: plastic bags, food, liquids, paper plates, plastic wrap, unnumbered
 plastic containers, mirrors, drinking glasses and glass or ceramic cookware or serving pieces,
 batteries, electronics, televisions, Styrofoam, lightbulbs, aerosol cans, yard waste, and any item
 containing residue from hazardous waste. The only accepted plastic bags are clear bags containing
 machine-shredded paper.
- Boxes that are too large to fit in the toter must be flattened and placed next to the toter.
- Please note: the recyclable toter is to remain with the house should you move. Also, you may label the toter with your street
 name and house number.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION

- April 1 through December 15: unlimited yard waste is collected on the day following your household trash and recycling collection and is taken to a composting site. Yard waste must be in biodegradable bags or trash cans weighing less than 50 pounds when full; plastic bags or boxes of yard waste will not be collected. Tree branches and shrubbery must be less than three inches in diameter and cut to lengths of three feet or less and must be placed in containers or bundled and tied. Yard waste must not extend above the top of containers.
- December 16 through March 31: a maximum of five containers of yard waste is collected with your regular trash as the compost facility is closed during this time. This is in addition to the maximum of 12 containers of regular trash. Plastic bags or trash cans may be used during this period.

2018 BUCKS COUNTY HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION EVENTS

Why bring your household hazardous wastes to a scheduled event? Household products containing toxic chemicals, like pesticides, oil-based paints, solvents, cleaning products, weed killers and automotive batteries can be a threat to people and the environment if improperly discarded. Never throw these materials into the trash, as the toxic chemicals may harm sanitation workers, or result in fires in collection vehicles. It is also not safe to pour them into a sink or storm drain as they can end up in the environment polluting the air, water, or soil.


Who pays to restore my broken outdoor water or sewer lines?

Many homeowners have the misconception that their local water or sewer provider is responsible for the water service line and sewer lateral line on their property. Contrary to this belief, the water and sewer lines that service your property are actually yours, and you are responsible for them. Many homeowners who are part of an association have a similar misconception that they are not responsible for their lines, but they very well may be. Unfortunately, many homeowners only learn this when they find themselves having a major problem.

On occasion, water companies will mail letters offering homeowners coverage on their outside lines. The homeowners inevitably react, and call their insurance company or their property manager to find out if this is already covered. Unfortunately, coverage on the external water and sewer lines is rarely – if ever – the case. Typically, insurance pays to restore an insured building or structure for damage caused by an insurable event (fire, water, smoke, etc.) In other words, insurance companies might pay for the damage the broken water line causes to your home, but not the repair of the broken line itself. In a homeowner's association, water and sewer lines are often considered "Limited Common Elements". If a limited common element only services one home, then that homeowner is likely responsible for the repair of the limited common element.

To summarize, the responsibility of the broken pipe lies with the homeowner in most cases. You may be thinking, "OK, I'm responsible... so now what?" There are a couple of options available. If your water or sewer provider offers coverage, you can purchase it through them. Please check with a water or sewer authority to see if they have an alternative such as **BCWSA's \$afeGuard™ Water & Sewer Maintenance Program.** This maintenance program offers a broader protection than the standard coverage offered by a water company. It is also available to Non-BCWSA customers in Bucks County & Montgomery County. For more information, please go to our website www.bcwsa.net or call 215-343-2538 ext.140. It is worth investigating your options to determine the best course of action for you.

RICHBORO NIKE BASE by James Briggs



I was asked by the Northampton Township Historical Commission to write an article on the former "Nike" site now utilized by the Township as their Recreation Center, 345 Newtown-Richboro Road. There has been a plaque at this location since 2007 commemorating its former use. But the metamorphosis has been so complete few residents realize the property's former life in the defense of our country.

This article will present the history of the Army Nike missile program, data on the specifics of the Richboro site, and transition to its present use. A later article will present personal memories of this Army base, interaction with the local population, and contribution to our country's "Cold War". Hopefully younger Township residents will appreciate the past efforts of their Supervisors as they utilize recreational opportunities at this site.

By the end of the Second World War, it was increasingly obvious to the military that standard anti-aircraft guns were ineffectual against high-altitude aircraft. In 1945 Bell Labs was contracted to develop a surface-to-air radar-guided missile system called Project Nike. Progress proceeded slowly until the realization was made that Soviet developments meant the entire continental United States was accessible to enemy bombers.

The project was accelerated and the first plane was destroyed by a missile at White Sands, N.M. on 11/27/51. Nike-Ajax missiles were rushed into production eventually resulting in 350 batteries at over 200 key urban, military, and industrial sites in the U.S. Production of this missile was stopped in 1958 at over 13,000 manufactured, replaced by the Nike-Hercules (nuclear capable), and ending with the Nike-Zeus.

The Philadelphia area with its refinery and chemical industries was protected by a total of 12 bases. There were 3 missile sites in Bucks County: Warrington designated as PH-099; Richboro as PH-07; and Bristol Twp. PH-15. The bases were named for their positions on an imaginary circle with true North at zero degrees and an unknown location in Philadelphia. as the center. Richboro and Warrington (the only base with 2 batteries) were manned by regular Army units and Bristol by the PA Army National Guard.

The U.S. government announced in March of 1954 that there was going to be a Nike base in Richboro and condemned the approximately 19 acre site on Newtown Road on 6/10/54. In September 1955 they purchased approximately 10 acres on Twining Ford Road 1/2 mile away and the base began operations in 1956. All Nike bases contained IFC (firing control and radar facilities); Administrative (enlisted men's barracks, offices, Officer's quarters, and a mess hall); and launch sites. The barracks in Richboro are close to Newtown Road. They were first converted to the Northampton Township Library in 1970 and are now the main building in the Recreation Center. The mess hall was on the Twining Ford Road property, but there are different accounts on the barracks and mess hall locations.

The Richboro Nike base followed the usual pattern of separating the radar (Twining Ford Road) from the launch area. The actual missle 20 feet long and 12" in diameter utilized solid propellant. Conversely the booster was liquid-fueled with a mixture, so caustic personnel wore protective clothing. Because of the liquid chemicals most Nike bases including Richboro were designated Federal hazardous cleanup sites. The booster supplied such rapid acceleration separating the radar from the launch site gave more time to calculate the missile's trajectory.

Richboro's Nike site housed approximately 100 men often working 12 hour shifts. The base was equipped with 2 Type B magazines (missile storage area), 20 Ajax missiles, and 8 Type A launchers. The Type B magazine had blast-proof doors (presently welded shut and covered by batting cages) and an elevator tp raise the missile. Early in the program existing safety protocals mandated separating the missile launching area from the magazine. The large amount of acreage required made the system untenable where land prices were high. Most Nike sites like Richboro had underground installations lowering the real estate requirements.

The development of the more powerful and longer range Hercules missile lowered the number of sites required to protect a specific area. The Richboro Nike Base was deactivated in 1961 along with 6 other bases protecting the Philadelphia area. The remaining base in this area, Warrington, was active until 1971. And all sites in the U.S. were removed prior to the signing of the 1972 Salt I treaty with Moscow prohibiting anti-ballistic missile (ABM) capabilities.

The Army offered the Richboro site to the Navy with existing bases at Johnsville and Willow Grove. In 1965 the Navy announced their intent to build 200 apartment untis at the Richboro site. The only housing allowed by Northampton Township Zoning Laws at this time were 1/2 acre lots. Representatives from the Township Supervisors, Council Rock School Board, and the local community went to Washington and argued against the proposal before a Senate Hearing Committee. On 12/9/66 the government advised Northampton that thew Nike Base was officially declared surplus government property. The Township immediately applied for ownership of the old Nike Base and transferred the upper site to the Council Rock School District.


