Dear Northampton Township Resident:

I sincerely hope everyone had a safe and happy holiday season and the New Year is off to a great start. On December 20, 2017, the Northampton Township Board of Supervisors approved the 2018 Annual Budget. Included in this edition of the Township Newsletter you will find updates on various Township projects and initiatives contained in the budget that have been identified as priorities for 2018. First, the Township is planning on building a new Police Station on Township Road at the location of the currently occupied Northampton Bucks County Municipal Authority at 111 Township Road. This will include renovating the existing building, along with building an addition. Before this can occur however, the Municipal Authority will be relocating this spring to their new administration building located at the former vacant Fox Chase Bank in Richboro.

Other capital infrastructure improvement projects in the planning and design stages include:

- Streetscape improvements to Buck Road in Holland, including a new bridge over Mill Creek, and re-alignment of the Old Bristol Road and Buck Road intersection to allow for new left turn lanes:
- The construction of a roundabout at Second Street Pike and Bustleton Pike;
- Widening the intersection of Jacksonville Road and Almshouse Road to install left turn lanes, repairing the bridge on Lower Holland Road;
- Improving sidewalks in Richboro to make it more walkable for pedestrians; and
- · Recreation Improvements at the Civic Center

Many of these projects are consistent with the Township's on-going economic development initiatives proposed in the Holland and Richboro Master Plans. In addition, I'm pleased to report the Township has been fortunate recipients of numerous commonwealth grants totaling \$8,860,000 to help offset the cost of these exciting projects.

As I hope you can see, and agree, your Northampton Township Board of Supervisors have been working very hard to improve the quality of life for Northampton Township residents. The 2018 Budget funds future projects that will continue to make Northampton Township a great place to live, work and do business.

# 2018 NORTHAMPTON TOWNSHIP BUDGET OVERVIEW

On December 20, 2017, the Northampton Township Board of Supervisors adopted the 2018 Budget. The 2018 Budget consists of 19 funds detailing the projected revenues and expenditures for the coming year in line item format. Working with Department Directors, Administration, and the Board of Supervisors, the budget is developed by analyzing trends in revenues and expenditures from prior years, reviewing individual line item projections, and evaluating programs, services, and current economic conditions. The budget separates operating and capital appropriations. The budget includes separate operating funds for general government functions, fire and rescue services, refuse collection, library services, senior center operations, contracted street lighting, parks and recreation services, debt service, state highway aid allocations and pension funds.

The Township's ten (10) year capital improvement plan serves as a guide when budgeting for capital appropriations. The Administration and Department Directors update the plan annually through a series of meetings to discuss on-going capital needs. The budget includes necessary appropriations for improvements to the Township's road system, public buildings, storm sewer system, bridges, traffic signals, and park facilities.


Capital appropriations for general purposes are budgeted in the Capital Reserve Fund. Capital appropriations for parks and recreation, fire and rescues equipment, road equipment, senior center, and library services are included in separate funds and limited to those specific government functions. Appropriating capital project costs into special purpose funds eliminates wide fluctuations in government operating appropriations from year to year caused by one-time capital expenses.


# **2018 TAX LEVY SUMMARY**

# THE BUDGET FUNDS NECESSARY CAPITAL INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS AND EQUIPMENT ACQUISITIONS

The Capital Reserve Fund accounts for general capital equipment purchases and infrastructure improvement projects. Examples of capital expenditures include roadway and drainage facility improvements, traffic signal enhancements, equipment acquisition, property acquisition and facilities construction and repair.

Revenues in the Capital Reserve Fund come from a variety of sources including grants, loans, developer contributions and a transfer from the General Fund dedicated to capital appropriations. The General Fund has transferred \$297,000 each year to the Capital Reserve Fund since 2014. Beginning in 2018, this amount will increase to \$684,000 to complete several major improvement projects.

The Board of Supervisors recognized the need to construct a new police facility to replace the existing building designed for 26 officers, but now houses 43 officers and 10 civilian personnel. Construction for the new Police Station is expected to begin spring, 2018 at the location of the currently occupied Northampton Bucks County Municipal Authority at 111 Township Road.



Other projects include engineering design for an extension of Township Road to the intersection of Second Street Pike and Bustleton Pike and construction of a roundabout to replace the existing traffic signal. The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation supports the project, and the Township received a PennDOT Multi-Modal Grant of \$350,000 to fund preliminary engineering estimated at \$480,000.

The Dreher Group, developers of the Addisville Commons Center will contribute another \$75,000 toward preliminary engineering costs as part of its traffic system impact requirement. The Richboro Master Plan identifies this project as a key component of the Township's economic development initiative to relieve congestion at the intersection of Second Street Pike and Almshouse Road, and improve pedestrian safety.

Another future project involves streetscape and roadway improvements to Buck Road in Holland. The Township was successful in having this project included on the State Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP). It was the only project in Bucks County selected for inclusion on the TIP. The project involves constructing a new bridge over Mill Creek with additional lanes, re-alignment of Buck Road and Old Bristol Road intersection, and adding left turn lanes in all directions. It also includes streetscape improvements such as sidewalks, street trees, and ornamental street lighting along a portion of Buck Road. This is the first phase of the Buck Road improvement project proposed in the Holland Master Plan. The Township is responsible for preliminary engineering costs of \$450,000, with final engineering and construction paid with Federal Transportation Funds administered by PennDOT. The estimated cost for final engineering and construction is \$8 Million.

A third traffic improvement project involves widening and installation of left turn lanes at Jacksonville Road and Almshouse Road. Engineering design is approximately \$118,000, and the construction estimate is \$1.3 Million. Completing the engineering design will allow the Township to be competitive in seeking grant funds for construction through several state programs.

The Township has also undertaken two sidewalk improvement projects in Richboro. The first involves construction of sidewalks in areas where none exist and replacing existing sidewalks that do not meet current ADA standards. Phase 1 of the project requires \$161,000 for engineering design and \$1 Million for construction. The township applied for a \$790,000 grant to fund final design and construction costs.

In addition, the Township undertook preliminary engineering to address the need for sidewalks on Second Street Pike from Tanyard Road to Crossroads Plaza Drive. This phase "1A" will address the more difficult and costly problem of crossing Iron Works Creek and installing sidewalks along Iron Works Creek Park on Second Street Pike. Engineering design is \$210,000 and the construction cost is \$800,000. The Township currently has a pending grant application with the PennDOT TAP Program to fund 80% of the project cost.

The Recreation Capital Fund provides financial resources to maintain and improve recreation facilities and parks infrastructure. An inter-fund transfer from the Parks and Recreation Operating Fund to the Recreation Capital Fund supports capital improvements. Impact fees on new development will provide an additional \$120,000 toward capital projects. The budget includes an additional \$75,000 for capital projects. The Township received \$110,000 from the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) representing 50% of approved grant funds, that paid the engineering and planning costs related to the Civic Center improvements.

The Highway Aid Fund accounts for the Township's share of liquid fuels tax dollars provided by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for maintenance of local roadways. The Commonwealth generates funds through a tax on motor fuels. Municipalities receive approximately 12 percent of the total collected by the Commonwealth, and PennDOT uses the remaining funds to maintain state-owned roadways. The Public Works Department paved 5.46 miles of the road system in 2017. The 2018 Road Maintenance Program includes 2.5 miles of milling and paving, and 6 miles of micro surfacing. The estimated cost of this work is \$915,000.

# **FUTURE TRENDS AND OUTLOOK**

The Township has embarked on an aggressive economic development initiative intended to revitalize the villages of Richboro and Holland as walkable town centers with increased density for commercial uses, making goods and services available locally for township residents. Planning tools such as the Richboro and Holland Master Plans form the blueprints for future growth and development in these areas. A significant part of the growth initiative involves infrastructure improvements to enhance the appearance, safety, and walkability of the villages. These projects will improve traffic flow, reduce congestion, improve pedestrian safety and walkability, and create attractive downtown areas that promote and encourage shopping, dining, and entertainment. All projects that will make Northampton Township a great place to live, work and do business.

# NORTHAMPTON TOWNSHIP WELCOMES NEW SUPER WAWA

A brand new Wawa opened its doors and gas pumps on December 15th, 2017 at Addisville Commons. A bigger store with more parking for customers was much needed from the smaller Wawa at 750 2nd Street which opened its doors January 22, 1972.



Members of the Northampton Fire & Police Departments competed in a Hoagie Building contest. The Police Depart beat the Fire Department, however both were winners as Wawa generously donated \$1,000 to each team's charitable cause. The recipient of the \$2,000 donation was the Bucks County Hero Scholarship Fund.

# FAST FACTS FROM J. P. MASCARO & SON . . .

### ON WASTE REMOVAL

- When should trash be placed at the curb? Place trash & recyclables out after 6:00 p.m. the night before your pickup day. Place containers so they are not blocked by parked vehicles.
- What size containers should I use? Household waste containers should be no bigger than 32 gallons. Each household is limited to (12) bags or cans of trash per collection.
- How do I dispose of leftover paint? Evaporate latex paint by air-drying or mixing with kitty litter, shredded newspaper or other absorbent. Double bag the can (s) and put out with your regular trash.

### **ON BULK ITEMS**

- When are bulk items collected? Bulk items are picked up on the same day as your regular trash & recyclable day.
- What type of bulk items are collected? Examples of regular bulk items include furniture, cabinets, washers & dryers, mattress & box spring.
- How much can I discard at once? The limit is one bulk item per week.
- What about refrigerators? Refrigerators, air conditioners, & humidifiers contain Freon, which is considered hazardous; you must call to schedule a pick up, 1-800-432-1616. There is no charge for this service.

# **ON HOLIDAY PICKUPS**

 What if my pickup falls on a holiday? If a scheduled holiday (Memorial Day, Independence Day, etc.) falls on your regular pickup day, trash & recyclables will be collected the next day. Example: Monday, Memorial Day, Monday collection will occur Tuesday.

# From the Fire Marshall

# **COLD WEATHER FIRE SAFETY**

As we move through the cold days and colder nights of the winter months many residents utilize wood stoves or fireplaces. In addition to inspecting and cleaning your chimney annually, ash disposal from these operations must be done safely. Fireplace, and stove ashes can remain hot for two weeks or more. Ashes should be stored in a covered metal container outside your home away from the house. Never ever store them inside your house or garage!

Space heaters need space, and proper electric supply. If you use an electric space heater plug it into a properly sized electrical receptacle. Avoid the use of extension cords unless properly sized to handle the heater. Never use multitap or power strips for these units. Maintain adequate clearance from your heater to combustibles as specified in the manufactures instructions. Frozen pipes are a pain, and inconvenient at the least. Never thaw your pipes with a torch, as this can lead to a fire. Hairdryers can be utilized with caution; however, it is best to slowly thaw a frozen pipe with warm air. # **CAN YOU HEAR YOUR SMOKE DETECTORS?**

Early smoke detection is critical to surviving a residential fire. Many people who awake to the sound of a smoke detector believe the noise has just begun. In fact, the smoke and fire may have been present for some time and the smoke has finally reached the detector nearest their bed. Even if there are detectors in the basement or the family room, there is little chance of hearing them in a second floor bedroom during sleep. Different levels of sleep may affect your hearing ability. Deep sleep essentially eliminates hearing. You have

shut down. Light sleep may find you partially awake but the drone of an AC unit or window fan may be enough to drown out the alert of a smoke detector.

There is new technology available to help this situation. "Wireless" technology has come to smoke detectors. These are battery detectors which send and receive signals to and from each other. If one wireless detector is in your basement and one is in your bedroom, they both make noise if either detects smoke. You are now alert to the early presence of smoke. They are the equivalent of "hardwired" detectors without the costs associated with that type of installation. The Northampton Township Office of the Fire Marshal and the National Fire Protection Association recommend that a smoke detector be installed in every bedroom, outside every sleeping area (usually a hallway), each floor and the garage. Smoke does not penetrate doors. Many older homes were constructed at a time when building codes did not require the installation of a smoke detector in a bedroom. The installation of these relatively inexpensive units (around \$30 per device) may just save your life in a fire situation. The office of the Fire Marshal strongly recommends that you upgrade your homes with this new technology. # Don't Kick that TV to the Curb!

Televisions, along with computers and some other electronics (covered devices), can no longer be disposed of with municipal waste under the Covered Devices Recycling Act of 2010. Many of these electronics contain mercury, lead, arsenic, chromium and other potentially hazardous substances. Listed are several location to drop off your television, and companies that will come to pick up your television for recycling. Please confirm the program, fees and any other conditions that may apply prior to dropping off your television.

# **Building and Codes Department**

Frequently, our department receives phone calls from residents about paint markings on the roadway or lawn area in front of their house. What exactly are these marks and what do the colors mean? It is all related to a **Pennsylvania One Call**.

Whenever there is excavation or digging, it is the law that a Pennsylvania One Call must be made by dialing 8-1-1. When this call is made, all utility companies come out and identify their particular utility by color. For example, water is blue, electric is red, cable is orange, etc. Due to the frequency of requests for service, many of these calls are related to the cable companies.

The marks that you see are the locations of these particular utilities. In many cases, they are in the roadway itself. Many other times, however, the utilities are located in the right-of-way adjacent to the curb. Township and State right-of-ways extend beyond the roadway and curb. In most residential developments, the right-of-way extends 10 feet beyond the curb. In response to many questions that we receive, the markings are not on private property, but rather in the right-of-way that is designated for these utilities. In addition, there are often easements that run through private property to carry utilities as well.

If you have any questions, feel free to contact the Building and Codes Department at 215-355-3883. Most importantly, if you are doing ANY digging or excavation on your property, you are required to make a Pennsylvania One Call by dialing 8-1-1. It can prevent major problems with a simple phone call. It's also the law!

# **Public Works**

### WINTER SNOW REMOVAL OPERATIONS

The Northampton Township Public Works Department is responsible for clearing snow and ice on approximately 185 miles of roads, including 167 cul-de-sacs. The Department also clears parking areas at the Administration Building, Police Department, Library, Recreation Center and Senior Center.

Our Department goal is to make all Township-owned roads and facilities safe and accessible to the public during the winter season, and to clear our streets in a timely manner. Because of the potential hazard to the motoring public from severe winter storms, careful planning begins in early October by preparing our equipment, hiring subcontractors, and scheduling manpower. Such things as the rate of snowfall accumulation, moisture content, day and

nighttime temperatures, wind direction and velocity, and storm duration are all factors that create unique challenges for each storm with the result that no two storms are ever identical. This means that we must be prepared for anything that Mother Nature may throw at us. Your cooperation is key to an effective winter

storm operation. Below please find important information provided to assist Township residents this winter season that will help our efforts

Please keep trash and recycling containers, portable basketball and hockey nets, etc. out of the roadways. It is a violation to park any motor vehicles on any public street within the Township during the period of time commencing after snow begins to fall and ending seventy-two (72) hours after the cessation of a snowstorm.

The Public Works Department Personnel recognize the frustration snow removal causes, particularly when you've already cleared your driveway or sidewalks. PLEASE NOTE: If your road is now yet plowed, crews WILL be around which will cause snow to accumulate at the end of your driveways. To avoid this frustration, there are options: 1). Wait until the roads are clear to clear your driveways, or 2.) Clear an area to the right of your driveway. (See image at right) Very rarely do Township plows physically contact mailboxes. Damage to mailboxes are a result of snow and ice being pushed into mailboxes. To minimize the chances of damages occurring, clear away from your mailboxes in advance of plows in your area whenever possible.

# Avoid the "Second Shovel" After a snowstorm, how many times have you shoveled your driveway only to have it plowed in when your local snowplow comes through? Clearing an area to the right of your driveway (as seen in the diagram below), giving the snow on the plow a place to go other than your driveway, should keep you from having to do the same job twice. Lastly, please note that it is a violation of the township code for a property/business owner (or your snow removal contractor) to throw, shovel or plow snow into or upon any roads and streets within the Township. If you can stay off the roads during storms, please do. If a roadway is closed, please do not move the barricades or drive around them! The road is closed for safety reasons. Thank you for your support and cooperation and have a safe and happy winter season from the Northampton Township Public Works Department.
