STATE OF THE TOWNSHIP UPDATE

2016 FINANCIAL ACTIVITY:

- Approved 2017 budget; No tax increase for fourth straight year
- Approved \$1.3 million of Additions and Alterations for our Public Works Building; paid with the Bond Financing we did in 2015.
- Approved and completed Work for \$3.6 million for roadway milling, paving and associated work. Over 12 miles of Township Roads; paid with bond financing; PennDOT also repaved most of Route 232 and installed handicap curbs at all four way crossings. At no cost to the Township. Township Public works completed paving and micro-surfacing of an additional 5.25 miles.
- Approved and completed \$509,000 of widening, curbing, traffic calming islands and creation of left turn lanes along the frontage of the Civic Center. Much safer getting in and out of Center. Paid with Bond money.
- Approved and completed \$253,395 for Civic Center and Municipal Park Improvements; Tennis and Basketball Courts,
- Applied for a Multi-Model Grant Application to the PA Department of Transportation to fund an engineering study for sidewalk improvements in Richboro.
- Applied for and received \$250,000 Grant from PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources for Civic Center Improvements.
 50% match required. Project added parking, relocated baseball field, added new trail connections, and improved storm water management.
- Awarded \$20,880 Grant for Penn Dot Green Light Go program for traffic signal Improvements at Upper Holland and Holland Road. 50 % match required.
- Awarded \$220,000 Grant from DCNR for Civic Center Improvements. 50% match required. Funds will be used in 2017 and thereafter.
- Awarded a \$350,000 Multi-Modal Grant from PennDOT to design an extension of Township Road to the intersection of Bustleton Pike and Second Street Pike. The project will relieve congestion at 232 & 332.
- Participated in the PennDOT Bridge Bundling Program to replace the bridge on Willow Road, saving taxpayers over \$400,000.
- Successful in getting Buck Road Streetscape Project approved for funding on State Transportation Improvement Plan. \$6 million total project cost. Township share is \$425,000 for preliminary engineering. The project includes replacing bridge over Mill Creek at the former Mill Race Inn property and re-aligning the intersection of Buck and Old Bristol Roads.
- Received approval from the National Parks Service to construct a trail connection to Municipal Park on a 2-acre parcel acquired from the Navy. Project to be completed in 2018.
- Implemented a defined contribution pension plan for new hires that will reduce long term pension costs.
- Negotiated a 5-year contract with the Police Benevolent Association that reduces healthcare costs by \$400,000 and provides budget stability for police services through 2020.
- Eliminated the Per Capita Tax

- Approved new Ordinance regulating Excessive Noise, Motorized Dirt Bikes, and All Terrain Vehicles
- Approved new Ordinance regulating Medical Marijuana Growers and Dispensaries
- Approved new Ordinance regulating Transient Dwellings

LAND DEVELOPMENT:

- Approved land development for Council Rock School Holland Middle School
- Approved Final Land Development for Russell Tract Second Street Pike and New Road. Five new family homes in Churchville
- Approved Final land Development for Harriet and New Road Two Single family homes in Churchville.
- Approved Final land development for 444 St Leonard's Nine single family homes in Holland
- Toll Brother site on Hatboro Road 40 Homes; Waverly subdivision to start soon- 15 homes; Development on 2nd Street Pike, six homes being built

2017

- Design and start building new Police Station; Paid with bond financing and hopefully State Grants.
- Substantially complete design work for Buck Road Streetscape Improvements including new bridge over Mill Creek.
- Oversee re-development of former Mill Race Inn; several people interested. Long legal battle coming to end.
- Complete work at Public Works Buildings in Richboro.
- Continue to pave more roads throughout the Township. 5 miles programmed. Paid with Liquid Fuels Funds from PennDOT.
- Make major sidewalk improvements in Richboro. Applied for state grant to complete missing sidewalks and replace existing sidewalks in need of repair.
- Re-bid installation of decorative crosswalks and handicapped accessible ramps at 7 locations in Richboro with \$165,000 grant from PennDOT.
- Negotiated replacement of the lattice cell tower in Richboro with Crown Castle Corporation. The new structure will be a stealth design and built to resemble a bell tower.
- Complete the design of Township Road extension and seek grant funds for construction.
- Construct a new outdoor restroom facility at the Civic Center with funds from sale of the Maier property.
- Complete waterline installation project in Hidden Meadow development to address TCE groundwater contamination. Project includes public water installation in adjacent Warwick Township fully paid by a \$1.8 million DEP grant.
- Complete the Richboro Master Plan to guide future development in the village. The plan completed at no cost to the Township by the Bucks County Planning Commission.
- Complete Architectural Guidelines for Village Overlay Districts in Richboro and Holland to insure architectural and historical integrity. Guidelines completed at no cost to the Township by the Bucks County Planning Commission.
- Complete the Comprehensive Plan Update to guide development Township-wide for the next 10 years.
- Complete an update to the Township's Act 537 Sewage Facilities Plan to guide process for sewage facilities planning and address
 wastewater treatment needs for the long term.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION CHANGE

April 1 - December 15: Unlimited yard waste will be collected the day after your trash day.

- Yard Waste will only be collected in cans or biodegradable bags. Be sure the bags do not weigh more than 50 pounds when full. Biodegradable bags can be purchased at the administration building for \$.40 each or in bundles of 50 for \$20.
- Tree branches and shrubbery must be no more than 36 inches long and less than 3 inches in diameter. They must be bundles and tied, taped or put in biodegradable bags. Branches or shrubbery cannot extend over the top of the can.

HELPFUL TIPS:

Please put your street name and house address on your recyclable toter. If you move out of the Township leave the recyclable toter with the property. The toter is the property of Northampton Township.

Veterans' Commission Announces Plans For 2017

The Northampton Township Veterans Commission was formed to provide support and guidance for veterans in the Township as well as to plan and execute patriotic events within the township. The commission consists of seven members who serve for staggered terms as appointed by the Board of Supervisors. 2017 members are: Tom Yaegel (Chair), Mike Bodkin, (Vice-Chair), Amie Houser (Secretary), Wendell Rich, Kristen Reilley, Brian Maloney, and Tim O'Donnell.

Typically, three events are organized by the Commission each year.

- The annual Memorial Day Commemoration will be held on Monday, May 29 beginning at 9:00am at Robert J. Dembowski Veterans Memorial Park located at Second Street Pike and Newtown-Richboro Road. The event honors the sacrifices of US Army PFC Robert J. Dembowski and Master Sergeant Kenneth B. Ewell as well as all those who have given their lives in defense of freedom. This year's honored guest will be former Congressman Mike Fitzpatrick.
- The Northampton Township Flag Day celebration will be held on Wednesday, June 14 beginning at 6:00pm at the Veterans Memorial located in front of the township building at 55 Township Road. A feature of the ceremony is the honoring of the flag by local Boy Scout and Girl Scout Troops as well as respectful disposal of worn and tattered flags for township residents. Please assure that your old US flags receive proper disposal by bringing them to the township building during normal business hours.
- The Northampton Days Community Festival begins each year with a flag raising ceremony and a speaker honoring the dedication and sacrifice of our first responders including township police, fire and emergency medical personnel. This year's event is being planned to take place at 10:00am on Sunday, September 10.

Interested Northampton veterans and citizens are invited to attend the monthly meetings of the Veterans Advisory Commission. Meeting dates are posted on the township web site.

What is Storm Water Runoff?



One of the most significant, yet unrecognized groups of water contaminants is storm water pollutants. When it rains, storm water runs over yards, streets, roads, highways, parking lots, parks, and playgrounds, carrying with it everything in its path, including debris and pollutants. Eventually, the water will travel to a stream, either over land or via a storm drain. Storm drains are frequently located alongside streets and parking lots. Unlike sanitary sewers that divert water to a treatment plant directly from your home, storm drains lead directly to surrounding lakes and rivers without any type of treatment. All the debris and pollutants that were picked up by storm water runoff end up in your lakes and streams!

Where Does the Pollution Come From?

Most contaminants are made up of common items used by residents, businesses and visitors, such as fertilizers, car oils and greases, yard clippings, soil, and pet wastes. Here are some tips you can follow to help keep pollution from entering lakes and streams via storm water runoff.

TIPS TO KEEP YOUR RIVERS, LAKES AND STREAMS CLEAN

- Never dump anything down a storm drain!
- Use an oil pan when changing oil to keep fluids off the pavement. Check local body shops and quick lubes to find a place to appropriately dispose of used oil.
- Bag pet waste and dispose of it in a trash can.
- Leave grass clippings on your lawn as an alternate nutrient to fertilizer. If a fertilizer is necessary, choose a slow-release product and test your soil to find out how much fertilizer your lawn actually needs.
- Wash your car on your lawn so excess water, chemicals, and dirt is filtered through the lawn.
- Keep household hazardous wastes, such as harsh cleaners, paint, car fluids, and batteries from entering lakes and streams by disposing at a household hazardous waste center. Try using environmentally-safe alternatives or recipes with non-hazardous ingredients.
- Use a broom rather than a hose to clean up grass clippings and dirt.
- Keep a trash bag in your car... and use it!

THE BEGINNINGS OF THE CHURCHVILLE NATURE CENTER

The origins of the Churchville Nature Center date back to the early 1960s, a time when rural Bucks County began to give way to suburban development. County government officials and citizen groups saw a need to preserve areas of open space and as a result the Bucks County Department of Parks was formed.

One of the first sites chosen was the area now known as Churchville Nature Center, in large part due to its proximity to the Churchville Reservoir. The reservoir was built by the Philadelphia Suburban Water Company between 1941 and 1943, when a dam was constructed to impound the waters of the Iron Works Creek.

The resulting reservoir, historically known as Springfield Lake, was designed to hold a reserve water supply for use under drought conditions. A regulated flow of water was transported along the Iron Works and Mill Creeks and then into the Neshaminy Creek, where the water could be drawn through a pumping station at Neshaminy Falls, and piped to Philadelphia suburb communities.

Soon after its creation, the reservoir and its adjacent natural areas became havens for many bird species and other wildlife enjoyed by local birders and nature enthusiasts. It was this area that a group of local residents petitioned the County to preserve as a nature park. A citizens' group to promote the park's interest was formed and its existence was assured by the signing of a bond issued by the Bucks County Commissioners in 1960. Acquisition of the lands began in 1961 and by 1964 the County opened its first nature center, known as Churchville Park and Outdoor Nature Center.

Originally the old farmhouse, which still stands on the property, served as the park's headquarters and nature center. By 1971, the building housed a museum, meeting rooms, and the Lester S. Thomas Nature Library. Dave Williams was the park's first naturalist, followed by Harry Volker, and Julian Boryszewski, Jr. The 40 acre-park boasted a mile of nature trails including the Dr. Edwin Kroeker Trail and the Florence W. Grintz Bittersweet Trail, which was at an early date adapted for use as a trail for the blind and physically handicapped. The park was so well-visited that a new Nature Center building was erected

in 1976 designed by architect Paul d'Entremont of Haag & d'Entremont, a midtwentieth-century American architecture firm based in Bucks County and well known

for school design and architecture of this period. A feature of the building was its large octagonal program room. During the 1970s, the County entertained several proposals to expand Churchville Park. One plan recommended that the County assume control over the Water Company property and that the area be equipped with places for picnicking, additional roadways and parking facilities, and installation of a boat ramp to make the reservoir lake accessible for rowing and sailing. However, because of overwhelming negative responses from local naturalists' groups and lack of funds, these plans never came to fruition.

Over the past 40 years, attendance at the park has continued to grow, so much that the Nature Center recently completed its latest expansion project nearly doubling the size of the Nature Center building. The new green nature center was designed to complement the aesthetics of d'Entremont building.

BODY-WORN CAMERA'S (BWC)

The Northampton Township Police Department along with seven other police departments applied for a grant from the Department of Justice to purchase Body-Worn Cameras. Our department was one of seventy-three (73) law enforcement agencies nationwide



to receive this grant. This grant has enabled our department to purchase twenty-one (21) body cameras. These cameras will work in conjunction with the in car video cameras that are currently in use by our department.

Body-Worn cameras provide stronger community relations because video evidence helps to build public trust by offering all parties an extra sense of security with the knowledge that all interactions will be captured.

BARBEQUE CLEANING TIPS

It's that time of year again when folks think of spring cleaning, and begin to look forward to the summer season. The smell of food grilling on the barbeque fills our neighborhoods, and back yard patios become a central feature of our homes. The Northampton Township office of the Fire Marshal reminds all residents to barbeque safely. All grills should be cleaned, and gas fittings checked for leakage prior to use. All barbeque units should be used at least 10 feet from your home, or other combustible structure. Backyard fire pits, and other patio heating appliances can provide an enjoyable experience for your family, and guests. They can also be a nuisance to your neighbors. Unlike your fire place that discharges smoke at the rooftop level; backyard fire place units emit smoke at ground level. Often times these units are used when neighboring homeowners are on their own patios, or have their windows open. Residents are reminded to be aware of the smoke, and the wind direction when utilizing these units.

SPECIAL ASSISTANCE IN FIRE EMERGENCIES

Are you disabled and in need of special assistance evacuating your home in the event of a fire emergency? Do you have someone living with you in need of this assistance? The Northampton Township office of the Fire Marshal in conjunction with the Bucks County Department of Communications maintains a data base of homes linked to the 911 emergency communications system. Once registered, any 911 phone call linked to the address provided will enable the dispatcher to provide specific information to responding emergency services about special needs residents. Additional information is available by contacting the office of the Fire Marshal at 215-357-6800. Residents utilizing this program are asked to periodically review the information, and advise the Fire Marshals office of any changes.

Frequently, our department receives phone calls from residents about paint markings on the roadway or lawn area in front of their house. What exactly are these marks and what do the colors mean? It is all related to a Pennsylvania One Call.


Whenever there is excavation or digging, it is the law that a Pennsylvania One Call must be made by dialing 8-1-1. When this call is made, all utility companies come out and identify their particular utility by color. For example, water is blue, electric is red, cable is orange, etc. Due to the frequency of requests for service, many of these calls are related to the cable companies.

The marks that you see are the locations of these particular utilities. In many cases, they are in the roadway itself. Many other times, however, the utilities are located in the right-of-way adjacent to the curb. Township and State right-of-ways extend beyond the roadway and curb. In most residential developments, the right-of-way extends 10 feet beyond the curb. In response to many

questions that we receive, the markings are not on private property, but rather in the right-of-way that is designated for these utilities. In addition, there are often easements that run through private property to carry utilities as well.

If you have any questions, feel free to contact the Building and Codes Department at 215-355-3883. Most importantly, if you are doing ANY digging or excavation on your property, you are required to make a Pennsylvania One Call by dialing 8-1-1. It can prevent major problems with a simple phone call. It's also the law!



Northampton Township Wins Statewide Awards For Communication Efforts!

Northampton Township's efforts to keep its residents updated and informed about the community have earned the municipality two awards in the Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors' (PSATS) 49th Annual Township Citizen Communication Contest. The annual contest recognizes townships that have successfully communicated programs and activities to citizens.



Northampton received second place in the Class 1 Newsletters category (for townships with populations over 10,000) and third place in the Social Media category.

The contest attracted entries from across the commonwealth in eight categories, including printed and electronic newsletters, most improved newsletters, other publications, audiovisual communication, cable TV programs, social media, and websites. In all, 36 townships submitted 103 entries for this year's competition, and 21 townships won awards.




