THE GROUND OBSERVATION CORPS IN

NORTHAMPTON TOWNSHIP

As discussed in an earlier article, Northampton Township residents did their part supporting the troops in World War II by collecting scrap metal, newspapers, tin foil, used tires and even milkweed pods. Collecting these articles was something everyone could do, but there was another activity that only a few did. They were the Ground Observer Corps or GOC.

The Ground Observer Corps was modeled after the Aircraft Warning System, which was credited with saving Great Britain from destruction during WWII. Londoners stood on rooftops scanning the sky for incoming German Luftwaffe. In the U.S., observers sat in garages or barns, binoculars in hand, monitoring the sky for enemy aircraft. When an observer saw or heard an airplane, he relayed by telephone as much information as he could to an Army Filter Center. The ideal relay would include the number of planes, the model if known, number of engines, altitude – high, medium or low, whether seen or heard, speed – slow, fast or very fast, the observer's location and the direction the plane was heading. The army provided training and the 'spotter' was given a manual with photographs and drawings of all American, British, German, Italian and Japanese planes as they were known at the time.



The Filter Center compared the incoming report information with their known Army, Navy and civilian flights in the area, thereby 'filtering out' the enemy from the friendly. If the plane was determined to be unfriendly, fighter planes were scrambled to investigate or anti-aircraft fired. Fortunately, this procedure never had to be implemented in Northampton. But it can be assumed, however, that the west coast observers would have had a more demanding job, given the west coast's exposure to potential attacks from Japan, especially from off shore aircraft carriers. Even though all was quiet on the eastern front, Northampton did have an observer, Jean B. Luff, who became certified as a Recognition Observer in May 1944.

The value of these civilian observers should not be underestimated. At its peak, the GOC had 16,000 locations and 400,000 volunteers, freeing an equal number of military personnel for other duties. Obviously, this manpower was a significant contribution to the war effort. These volunteers were a cross section of the population ranging in age from seven to 86 years and comprising housewives, plumbers, college students, and lawyers, etc. Sky watching was an equal opportunity job.



By the late 1950's technology began to overtake man. Radio detection and ranging or "radar" was being developed and soon surpassed human visual capabilities. A network of radar stations operated by the North American Defense Command gradually took over the watch for bombers and missiles. Ground observers were phased out and finally disbanded in January of 1959.

Building & Codes




After a building permit is issued, the next step is the inspection process. The type of project will determine the type and number of inspections. With all projects, however, a final inspection is required.


Frequently, we encounter projects that do not receive final inspections. Contractors and homeowners often complete the project and fail to contact the Building Department to complete this final step. In many cases, contractors are paid in full and long gone. As a result, homeowners, who later have the inspection completed, discover that there are outstanding items to approve the project from a code compliance standpoint.

A CITIZEN'S GUIDE TO SNOW REMOVAL



Every winter storm, our crews work around the clock to clear the snow and ice. The township first plows major streets for emergency vehicle passage as the highest priority. Once all the streets are passable, crews then work on cleaning snow from intersections and parking spaces.

The township will plow "curb to curb" if there are no cars parked on the street. We know that residents hate the "windrows" (those long piles of snow on each side of the road) that plows leave behind, and that often bury freshly shoveled sidewalks and driveway aprons. We receive a lot of calls from angry folks that a plow has "pushed the snow back in their driveway". Unfortunately, the reality is that these "windrows" are an unavoidable part of plowing. You can reduce the amount of snow that ends up in your driveway by following the tips listed below.

Please be patient and courteous to crews. They are working long hours doing a difficult job with the goal of getting you out and about as soon as practical.

Tips for Shoveling Your Driveway

- Do not push snow from your walk, drive or parking area out into the street as it will only be pushed back in when the plow passes (and it is unlawful to do so an d you could be fined)
- When you clear snow, also clear the snow from the road about 15' feet "upstream" of plow traffic direction (the direction that the plows come from). On a standard two-way street this would be the left side of your driveway as you face the street. This way, when the plow passes by, less snow will be pushed back into your drive way. The smartest thing to do is not to shovel out the end of your driveway until the road is plowed. Otherwise your driveway will be plowed in again.

Chapter 15: Motor Vehicles and Traffic
Part 9: Snow Events §15-902. Parking Prohibited During Snow Event.

"It will be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, whether principal or agent, to park any motor vehicles on any public street within the Township during the period of time commencing after snow begins to fall and ending 72 hours after the cessation of a snowstorm."

This 2012 ordinance was established to improve the clearing of roads following snow events to provide residents with safe passable roadways.

10 Tips

Get Ahead of the Winter Freeze

It's not too early to begin preparing for the heating season. Check these 10 tips off your list and get ahead of the winter freeze.

	Our furnace has been inspected and serviced by a qualified professional during the last 12 months. (A furnace should be serviced at least once a year.)				
	Our chimneys and vents have been cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional. I have checked for creosote build-up. (Not cleaning your chimney is the leading cause of chimney fires from built up creosote. This service needs to be done at least once a year.)				
	Our wood for our fireplace or wood stove is dry, seasoned wood .				
	Our fireplace screen is metal or heat-tempered glass , in good condition and secure in its position in front of the fireplace.				
	We have a covered metal container ready to use to dispose cooled ashes. (The ash container should be kept at least 10 feet from the home and any nearby buildings.)				
	Our children know to stay at least 3 feet away from the fireplace, wood/pellet stove, oil stove or other space heaters.				
	Our portable space heaters have an automatic shut-off .				
	Our portable space heaters will be plugged directly into an outlet (not an extension cord) and placed at least three feet from anything that can burn; like bedding, paper, walls, and even people. (Place notes throughout your home to remind you to turn-off portable heaters when you leave a room or go to bed.)				
	We have tested our smoke alarms and made sure they are working. (You need a smoke alarm on every level of the home, inside each bedroom and outside each sleeping area. For the best protection, the smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.)				
	We have tested our carbon monoxide alarms and made sure they are working. (Carbon monoxide alarms should be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.)








Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

- DO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- Choose a CO alarm that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.

Have fuel-burning heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in. When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation. Never use your oven to heat your home.

Trash and Recycling



TRASH COLLECTION

- Trash, recyclables, and one bulk item are collected on the same day. Place trash at curb no later than 6 a.m. on the day of collection, but no earlier than 7 p.m. on the prior evening. Each household is limited to 12 bags or cans of trash per week.
- Use plastic or metal trash cans or plastic trash bags. All trash should be bagged. Please do not put out trash in paper bags, cardboard boxes, or containers smaller than 20 gallons.

RECYCLING

• The Township does single stream recycling, which means all recyclables go into the same bin. This includes plastics stamped #1 - #7, aluminum cans, foil, tin cans, paper, cardboard, and glass. No plastic bags.

YARD WASTE

Yard waste will be collected only in biodegradable bags. Make sure the bags do not weigh more than 50 pounds when full. Biodegradable yard waste bags can be purchased at the administration building for \$.40 a bag or \$20 for a bundle of 50.

- December 16 March 31: An additional five bags or cans of yard waste are permitted.
- April 1 December 15: Unlimited yard waste collected the day after your trash day.
- Tree branches and shrubbery must be no more than 36 inches long and less than 3 inches in diameter. They may be bundled then tied/taped, or placed into cans or biodegradable bags, as long as they do not extend over the top of the can/bag.
