MAILBOX DAMAGE DURING SNOW REMOVAL

We all know the aggravation that settles in during the winter season. As snow begins to accumulate, the risk for damage to properties and vehicles increase. Although most accidents can be avoided, one thing municipalities struggle with is the accidental damage to residential mailboxes. We know it's a concern: we had more than 130 mailboxes damaged in this past season's big storm. However, mailboxes may be damaged during snow clearing operations even under the best of conditions.

Mailboxes and posts in good condition generally withstand the force of snow plowed against them. In most cases, damage occurs during the process because aged posts are unable to withstand the force of heavy or wet snow pushed against them from snow clearing operations. So, it happens. Here's what you need to know though when an accident like this occurs during the next winter storm:

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

- All mailbox damage must be reported within 48 hours of an incident by contacting the Public Works Department at 215-355-3433. Upon notification, the Department will inspect and report its findings and any corrective action to the property owner.
- If a mailbox and/or mailbox post is damaged as a result of direct contact with a snowplow, our policy is to repair or replace installed mailboxes at a cost not to exceed \$60 for both the mailbox and post. If necessary, a temporary repair and/or replacement mailbox will be provided until permanent repairs can be made.
- Repairs will be made in accordance with the design standards of the United States Postal Service for minimum height and setback.

We understand some of our residents have mailboxes that have been purchased at a price point higher than the \$60 potential reimbursement. Although we would like to correct every situation to its previous state, sometimes we cannot fix every mailbox. So, whether a mailbox is one price or another, the reimbursement, if necessary, will remain at \$60 per mailbox and post. We apologize for any inconvenience this brings to our residents.

OTHER NOTES

Turf damage may also occur within the right-of-way area during plowing operations where curbs have not been installed. Any reported damage will be investigated by the Public Works Department, and any required corrective action will be addressed in the spring season by repairing the damage and spreading grass seed. The Township will not be responsible for landscaping including boulders, shrubs and trees placed in the right of way.

RECYCLING - TOTER BIN DISTRIBUTION

In 2012 Northampton Township partnered with Lower and Upper Southampton Township to contract collection services to J.P. Mascaro and Sons. As part of that agreement, each household received one 64-gallon toter with each township's name on it to encourage recycling in the community.

Although we have been generous since that time with providing residents with additional toters as needed, our supply is limited at this point and we can no longer give additional toters to households. There are exceptions, though:

WHAT DO I DO IF MY TOTER IS LOST OR STOLEN?

Report the incident to the Administration Department at 215-357-6800. When you have finished filing an incident report, our Public Works Department will contact you and organize a date to drop one off at your residence.

WHAT DO I DO IF I MOVE OUT OF THE TOWNSHIP?

All toters are the property of the Township and are not to be removed from the property. If you move, please leave the bins behind so the next resident can have the opportunity to recycle.

DOGS FOR THE ENVIRONMENT

Why?

Pet Waste is more than smelly and unsightly: it is a health risk to pets, creeks, lakes and people, especially children. Pet waste left on trails, sidewalks, streets and grassy areas are immediately flushed into the nearest waterway when it rains. Like human waste, animal waste may contain harmful bacteria and viruses, making the water unfit for irrigation, recreation or other uses. These bacteria and viruses can pose health risks to humans, such as Campylobacteriosis and Salmonellosis. In addition, pet waste contains nutrients that will speed up the growth of nuisance algae in lakes and rivers.

To report an illicit discharge to the storm water collection system or to a stream, creek or river, please call 215-355-3433.

WHAT IS EMERALD ASH BORER?

Emerald ash borer (EAB), Agrilus planipennis Fairmaire, is an exotic beetle that was discovered in southeastern Michigan near Detroit in the summer of 2002. The adult beetles nibble on ash foliage but cause little damage. The larvae (the immature stage) feed on the inner bark of ash trees, disrupting the tree's ability to transport water and nutrients. Emerald ash borer probably arrived in the United States on solid wood packing material carried in cargo ships or airplanes originating in its native Asia. Emerald ash borer feeds exclusively on ash trees in North America. Tens of millions of ash trees have been lost to this pest, which usually kills ash trees within 3 to 4 years of infestation.

WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT EAB:





Woodpeckers like EAB larvae; heavy woodpecker damage on ash trees may be a sign of infestation.

Adults leave a D-shaped exit hole in the bark when they emerge in spring.



It probably came from Asia in wood packing material.

CHIEF CLARK'S SAFETY TIPS

TURN SIGNALS

A new study by the Society of Automotive Engineers indicates the failure to use a turn signal results in more than twice the number of accidents that are caused by distracted driving. The study finds drivers across the country don't use their turn signal nearly half of the time when changing lanes, and people fail to signal a quarter of the time when making a turn. In all, creating a violation approximately 750 billion times a year.

So, please don't forget to use your turn signals!

SPRING AND SUMMER SAFETY AT HOME

We spend a large amount of time outside of our homes during the spring and summer months. We work on our lawns, gardens, host barbecues or maybe just relax at the pool. It is during these times that we sometimes forget to close our doors or leave windows open in the home. Open garage doors, in particular are used by individuals to enter the garage and then possibly the home to remove your valuable items. So please help us to reduce crime in our Township by securing your homes when you are outside.

Spring and summer is also the time that we also see an increase in contractor fraud. Remember selling a service or product in our Township requires a permit. The "quick driveway seal scam," the "repair the rain gutters" or "damaged siding" is a common way for criminals to access your property. They normally work in pairs and when one is speaking to you the other is attempting to enter your home. Please be aware of these scams and call the police department to report these individuals or if you have any concerns on solicitors.

Building & Codes



Roof replacement is one of the most common projects related to home ownership. Although it may seem uncomplicated from a construction standpoint, there are several requirements to take into consideration.

First, if going over an existing roof, only one layer of shingles is permitted under the new layer. On the other hand, if the existing roof is being stripped down to the sheathing, ice barrier protection must be installed. This is accomplished through an ice and water shield twenty-four inches up from the exterior wall or two layers of underlayment cemented together. Roofing must also be installed per the manufacturer's specifications.

In Northampton Township, a permit is required to replace your roof. As with all projects, homeowners should coordinate with their contractors regarding who will submit the necessary forms to our office. For your protection, homeowners should also verify that your contractor is registered with the State Attorney General through

the Pennsylvania Home Improvement Consumer Protection Act. If you have any questions, feel free to contact the Building and Codes Department at 215-355-3883. We'll be happy to answer any questions.

ARE YOU READY FOR AN EMERGENCY?

Northampton Township is susceptible to a variety of events both man made, and natural which can affect our community. These include hurricanes, tornados, winter ice, and snow storms, severe thunderstorms as well as hazardous materials incidents, and acts of terrorism. Many of these events can create situations which will disrupt your lives. Therefore it is important for you to have plans which address communications with your family, as well as a disaster supply kit in your home.

EVACUATION PLAN

It's a good time to make a family communications plan that includes an evacuation plan and coordinates with school, work, and community communications plans. Practice this plan with your family.

DISASTER SUPPLY KIT

It's also a good time to create a disaster supplies kit for your home. The kit should include enough supplies for each family member for four days. Remember to check your kit every six months. If you have special needs assess them before the event, and make the appropriate plans.

§13-104. False Alarms; Registration of Alarm Systems

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, including, but not limited to, an owner or lessee of any building in which a fire, holdup or burglar alarm has been installed:

- A. To cause, suffer, allow or permit the accidental or purposeful transmission of a false alarm signal from any public or private place to the Police Department or Fire Company.
- B. To cause, suffer, allow or permit to be made any report or request for police or fire service or assistance by any means of communication wherein the situation, condition, incident or emergency did not and does not exist.
- C. To fail to register with the Police Department an alarm system, to include, but not be limited to, burglary, robbery and fire, within 24 hours of the installation. Registration is to include the name, address and telephone number of the subscriber and of the installer and the name, address and telephone number of at least one person who has the knowledge and means to reset the alarm.

VETERANS ADVISORY COMMISSION

The Veterans Advisory Commission undertakes certain duties and responsibilities in connection with advising the Board of Supervisors on issues faced by resident veterans and active-duty personnel along with providing support to veterans and families in the community. Commission related programs include, managing the Township's Patriots Flag Program, Memorial Day ceremony, Flag Day ceremony, Veterans Day ceremony, and other patriotic programs. Additional suggestions in support of veterans are welcomed and open for careful consideration. All special request will be sent to the Board of Supervisors in accordance with the purposes of this Commission.

WELCOME HOME TRANSITION FOR RETURNING SERVICE MEMBERS

The following checklist will help with your transition upon returning home:

- 1. Receive your DD 214: Have your DD 214 recorded in the County Recorder's Office for free. Safeguard all your records. You will need them again in the future!
- 2. Visit your County Director of Veterans Affairs or Accredited Service Organization Representative for free.
- 3. Take a copy of all your records with you for your appointment, Service, Medical Records, Personnel Files, Dental Records. Have your County Director of Affairs or Accredited Veterans Service Officer review your records and advise you on the benefits you qualify for.
- 4. File for disabilities through an accredited Veterans Service Officer.
- 5. Fill out VA form 10-10 EZ for VA Healthcare Benefits.
- 6. Go to your local VA to turn in Form 10-10 EZ and schedule an appointment.
- 7. You qualify for 5 years of free healthcare through the VA from your separation date.
- 8. When you are ready to buy a home, inform your lender you are a Veteran and that you are interested in using the VA Home Loan.
- 9. Provide a copy of your DD 214, Disabled veterans have the funding fee waived, you can include the down payment in the loan.
- **10.** Visit your local Career Link Office, ask to speak with the veterans employment representative, get help finding a job, attend classes to help in your search for employment, military skills that may be used in civilian life are identified.
- 11. Visit colleges you are interested in The GI Bill, will help with payments for school, so ask to speak with the veterans representative on campus, always identify yourself as a Veteran and inquire about Yellow Ribbon funding in addition to GI Bill payments for college, many non-traditional programs are included in the Post 9-11 GI Bill for those that qualify.

ONE-ROOM SCHOOLS OF NORTHAMPTON

This article is based on the book, *A History of Northampton Township*, written by Virginia 'Ginny' Briggs Geyer. After moving into the township in 1964, Ginny became interested in preserving and celebrating Northampton Township's history and began what would be a lifelong passion for historical research and writing. Ginny was an active public servant, serving on the board of many Northampton historical groups for decades. She was a member of the 1972 Committee for the 250th Anniversary Celebration of the Founding of Northampton Township, as well as a founding member of Northampton Township Historical Society and the Northampton Township Historical Commission.

Besides researching and writing A History of Northampton Township in 1972, Ginny also researched all the original land grants and patents from William Penn until the year 1800 in Northampton Township, publishing a map. In 1985, she was on the Northampton Township Historical Study Commission, which published, *The Winds of Change: A Pictorial History of Northampton Township*. Ginny passed away on January 11, 2016 leaving Northampton Township a legacy of invaluable historical records that represent decades of research, and the Northampton Township Historical Commission wants to take this time to honor her memory.

The earliest settlers of Northampton were mainly farmers that faced many hardships upon their arrival. Trees needed to be felled and crops planted; houses and barns built; animals cared for; crops picked, processed and preserved; and cloth woven and sewn. While they might have brought with them a high value for education, these pioneers required the labor of their children to make their farms succeed. These children would have received their education at home as time allowed. As populations increased and communities became more settled, churches were established and with them schools.

Early schooling in the Province of Pennsylvania was entrusted to religious and private organizations. In 1776, a law was enacted requiring that a school be located within each town. There was a paid teacher, and families were charged for each student. In 1790, a law was passed for the education of the poor without a fee. Early Northampton Township "School Bills," dating to the period from 1806 to 1828, indicate that the County covered the costs of the teachers for students unable to pay for lessons. In the winter the fee was 4 cents per day per student, and in summer it was 3 cents per day. This included "quills and ink."

Each semester lasted only a few months; quite often the school session was two months in the winter, taught by a man, and two months in the summer, taught by a woman. Children generally walked several miles to school. Most boys attended the winter session, then worked in the fields during the summer. The younger children and older girls attended school in the summer, helping with food preserving at home in the fall and sewing and weaving in the winter. They learned the 3Rs, including enough arithmetic to keep farm accounts and make change in the shops. It became increasingly important to be able to read. Church bulletins and newspapers become available, so one could keep abreast of the news and letters kept one connected to family and friends from elsewhere.

The first recorded property for a school in Northampton Township was in 1737. Robert Heaton, a miller by trade, sold for 10 shillings a 40 foot square tract of land fronting on the road "leading from the Falls to Philadelphia [present-day Bridgetown Pike] . . . for the convenience and to the intent that a meeting house for public worship and a school house for the education of the youth may be both erected." The school was built, but no further records of the meeting house were found. The schoolhouse known as the **Pleasantville School**, which now stands on this Bridgetown Pike property (present 5 Bridgetown Pike), was probably built in 1850, replacing the earlier school. The school closed in the early 1920s and the property was sold in 1924. As was the case with many of the township's one-room schools, it was later converted to a private residence.

The only other eighteenth-century school for which a record has been found was built sometime after 1752 in Richboro. In that year, an acre of ground was purchased by the Dutch Reformed Church. A church was erected, a graveyard laid out, and soon afterward a school was built all within the area now encompassed by the graveyard stone walls of the present-day Addisville Cemetery. Records show that in 1821, the **Dutch Reformed Church School** was torn down and a new school was built just outside the cemetery after the church membership moved to the new North and South Reformed Church in Churchville. The church members, however, were to "have the privilege of Catekising and holding lectures . . . in said schoolhouse, but not to interfere with the schoolhouse." The new school stood until 1872, at which time it was demolished to make way for the Addisville Chapel to be built in its place.

By the early 1800's other school houses began to appear within the township. Over the next 60 years a total of 11 one-room schools are known to have been erected. In 1800, a lease for 99 years was granted by Hugh Edems to Garret Vanartsdalen and Robert Mearns for a 30-foot square school lot on Jacksonville Road near Almshouse Road. The **Jacksonville School** (685 Jacksonville Road) was erected on this lot, which the school board formally purchased in 1857. In 1819, the inhabitants of Northampton appointed several men "to establish and erect a school for the education of youth of their neighborhood" at the intersection of Buck Road and East Holland Road. This school was known as the **East Holland School** (1096 Buck Road).

In 1838, the **Forest Grove** or Bull Town School (1608 Hatboro Road) was built on Hatboro Road near Sackettsford Road. The ground for the **Groveland School** on Newtown-Richboro Road was purchased in 1849 and the building erected the following year. Records show that this school was closed in 1920 and sold for \$600.00 to a private owner (817 Newtown-Richboro Road). A one-room school formerly located on **Pulinski Road** was erected in 1849 on ground purchased for \$50. Classes were held for 15-20 years, before the property was sold in 1872 to a private owner. The **Rocksville School** (240 Holland Road) was built by the first half of the nineteenth century; the **Fairview School** (279 Bustleton Pike), north of Churchville on Bustleton Pike in 1868; and the **Pleasant Plains School** (813 New Road) in 1871.

In 1860, property was purchased on Second Street Pike at the present Davis Pontiac Site and the one-room **Richboro Elementary School** was erected. Two years later, the roof was raised to make the school into a two story building and in 1896, a two-year High School was begun in that building. This school was closed in 1913 when the new **Richboro School** building was erected near the center of Richboro, north of Almshouse Road. The original school building later became the first Richboro Firehouse and then an appliance store.

Following the building of the new Richboro School, the era of the township's one-room school buildings came to an end. The majority of Northampton's early schools were closed during the first two decades of the twentieth century and by the late 1920s all pupils attended the central school in Richboro. We are very fortunate to have the majority of these one-room schools still in existence thanks to the efforts of previous and present day owners.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION CHANGE

April 1 - December 15: Unlimited yard waste will be collected the day after your trash day.

- Yard waste will only be collected in cans or biodegradable bags. Be sure the bags do not weigh more than 50 pounds when full. Biodegradable bags can be purchased at the administration building or the library for \$.40 each or in bundles of 50 for \$20.
- Tree branches and shrubbery must be no more than 36 inches long and less than 3 inches in diameter. They must be bundled and tied, taped or put in biodegradable bags. Branches or shrubbery cannot extend over the top of the can or bag.
