Chairman's Message - 2020 Let's Go!

Dear Residents

Every year, Pennsylvania municipalities are required to formally reorganize the board officers, make appointments for professional services, and fill vacancies on volunteer boards and committees for the coming year.

On January 6, 2020, the Northampton Township Board of Supervisors met and by unanimous vote I was selected to serve as Board Chairman for 2020. Thank you to my fellow Board members for their support and confidence. I look forward to working with all of you, and all the residents of our Township to keep Northampton moving in a positive direction.

Let's take a look at things to come.

This year, the Township is completing the preliminary engineering and design work for the Iron Works Creek Sidewalk project near Tanyard Road and Second Street Pike. with construction fully funded by a Pennsylvania TAP Grant, this \$1MM project is expected to be completed this year and is part of the sidewalk enhancement initiative in the Richboro Master Plan.

Also, the Township will be expanding hours of service for our career fire fighters. Through a \$900,000 Federal Grant received in 2019, the Township will hire five new career fire fighters and expand the service coverage from five days per week to seven days a week, including holidays, 12 hours per day. This continues the Township's commitment to providing a combination volunteer and career fire service to Northampton Township residents 24 hours per day.

The Township will be making intersection and traffic signal improvements at Jacksonville & Almshouse Road. The Township spent \$40,000 for design plans, and through the help of the Bucks County Planning Commission, PennDOT has agreed to fully fund the project cost and include it as part of the Commonwealth's TIP (Transportation Improvement Plan). The total cost is \$1.5M and construction is expected to start in 2021.

The Board has heard from many of our residents about the importance of having dedicated walking and biking trails in our township. Another

project that will be completed this year is the construction of the New Road Trail. The trail will run along Maureen Welch Elementary School and connect to Municipal Park. The Township received a \$237,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation & Natural Resources to construct the trail and a small parking lot on New Road The Township's investment match for this project is \$40,000.

The last project to highlight is the construction of an All-Inclusive Playground in our Municipal Park on Hatboro Road. Partnering with the Miracle League, the Township received two grants totaling \$320,000. The playground is designed for people of all ages and abilities.

In 2020, we welcome our new Police Chief Steve LeCompte. Chief LeCompte has served our community for more than 30 years, working as a Patrol Officer, Sergeant, Lieutenant, and recently Acting Chief. Best of luck Steve!

Lastly, we look forward to the United States Census this spring. The Census counts every living person in all 50 states, District of Columbia and 5 U.S. Territories. The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. The accuracy of the Census is very important to our Township. Many grants and other forms of funding such as Emergency Services, Roads and Education are directly related to our population. Please remember to provide a full count. Don't forget the college students!

Our community has a lot to look forward to in 2020. The Board of Supervisors and Township Administration work very hard to keep Northampton Township a great place to live. I look forward to serving as Chairman for the Board of Supervisors and serving you.

2020 Census

Census results have an impact on planning and funding for health clinics and highways, fire departments and disaster response, education programs such as Head Start and college tuition assistance, and so much more.

Ways To Respond

Once you receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census, there are three ways to respond: online, by phone, or by mail. Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census from either a postal worker or a census worker.

- 95% of households will receive their census invitation in the mail.
- Almost 5% of households will receive their census invitation when a census



- taker drops it off. In these areas, the majority of households may not receive mail at their home's physical location (like households that use PO boxes or areas recently affected by natural disasters).
- Less than 1% of households will be counted in person by a census taker, instead of being invited to respond on their own.
 We do this in very remote areas like parts of northern Maine, remote Alaska, and in select American Indian areas that ask to be counted in person. (This is separate from our follow-up efforts; census takers will visit all households that were invited to respond on their own and haven't.)

Note: We have special procedures to count people who don't live in households, such as students living in university housing or people experiencing homelessness.

Depending on how likely your area is to respond online, you'll receive either an invitation encouraging you to respond online or an invitation along with a paper questionnaire.

Letter Invitation

- Most areas of the country are likely to respond online, so most households will receive a letter asking you to go online to complete the census questionnaire (or to respond by phone).
- We plan on working with the U.S. Postal Service to stagger
 the delivery of these invitations over several days. This way
 we can spread out the number of users responding online,
 and we'll be able to serve you better if you need help over the
 phone.

Letter Invitation and Paper Questionnaire

 Areas that are less likely to respond online will receive a paper questionnaire along with their invitation. The invitation will also include information about how to respond online or by phone.

What We Will Send in the Mail

On or between these dates you'll receive:

- March 12-20: An invitation to respond online to the 2020 Census. (Some households will also receive paper questionnaires.)
- March 16-24: A reminder letter.

If you haven't responded yet:

- March 26-April 3: A reminder postcard.
- April 8–16: A reminder letter and paper questionnaire.
- April 20–27: A final reminder postcard before we follow up in person.

We understand you might miss our initial letter in the mail.

- Every household that hasn't already responded will receive reminders and will eventually receive a paper questionnaire.
- It doesn't matter which initial invitation you get or how you get it—we will follow up in person with all households that don't respond.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING YOUR TRASH & RECYCLING SERVICE

Northampton Township, along with Upper & Lower Southampton Townships, is a member of the Southwestern Bucks County Solid Waste Committee (SWBSWC). Established over twenty (20) years ago, SWBSWC solicits proposals for residential trash & recycling collection services. These proposals result in four (4) different contracts. The first contract is with J.P. Mascaro & Sons to collect residential trash, recycling, and yard waste materials. Another contract is with Wheelabrator Technologies to receive and dispose of residential trash. The other two contracts are with Waste Management to receive and process recycling and yard waste materials.

When trash and recycling is collected curbside by Mascaro, they transport the trash to Wheelabrator's facility in Morrisville, PA, and deliver recycling and yard waste materials to Waste Management facilities in Philadelphia and Falls Township for processing.

Earlier this year, Mascaro wrongly distributed a flyer saying additional materials could now be accepted into the recycling process. These materials are called flexible plastics. This flyer was sent out in error.

Please disregard the flyer and do not include flexible plastic items in your recycling carts. They cannot be processed at the Waste Management Facility and will increase the amount of contamination in the recycling stream. This will increase the cost to dispose of recycling materials and could increase the trash fee charged by the Township for these services. Please continue to practice single stream recycling.

It's Simple - No Plastic Bags.

Waste Management wants to help you reduce recycling contamination. An impactful, straightforward solution to eliminate one of the biggest contaminants is ensuring there are no plastic bags and bagged recyclables in your recycling.

COLLECTION DAYS ARE ONCE A WEEK

Important information about your Trash, Bulk, Recycling, and Yard Waste collection:

- One (1) time per week collection
- Trash and Recycling and Bulk item on the same service day
- Holiday Schedule: skips one day (See Below)
- Green Carts: Single-stream recycling collection only!
- Yard waste collection is the day following collection of Trash/Recycling

Household Trash Collection

Trash will be collected once a week depending on where you live. Each household is limited to twelve (12) bags or cans of trash per collection. Collection starts at 6 am, so put trash to the curb the night before, or plan accordingly. Use plastic or metal trash cans or plastic trash bags. All Trash should be bagged, please do not put out trash in paper bags, cardboard boxes, or containers smaller than 20 gallons or larger than 32 gallons. These cause litter!

Holiday Schedule

If scheduled collection day is a holiday then collection will occur the next day. This will affect collection in all areas of the Township for the rest of the week. Example: Monday, Memorial Day, Monday collection will occur Tuesday, Tuesday collection on Wednesday and Thursday collection on Friday (for that week only). *Holidays:* New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

Bulk Item Collection

All residents may place one (1) bulk item curbside for collection per week. These items can include furniture, carpets, appliances and tree limbs or trunks larger than 3" in diameter (cannot be longer than 36") certain restrictions apply. Carpets and padding must be cut into 3-foot widths, rolled, tied or taped. Windows, mirrors, glass panels in doors, etc., must be taped in a crisscross pattern to prevent breakage. Only 10 rolls of carpet/padding per pick up. Refrigerators, air conditioners, and humidifiers contain Freon, which is considered hazardous; you must call to schedule a pick up, **1-800-432-1616**. There is no charge for this service.

Disposal of Household Paints

Latex paint: Let paint dry in can. Adding kitty litter or a commercial drying agent will speed up the drying process. When paint is dry, double bag the can before putting it in the trash. Leaking paint will damage our trucks and stain your street.

Oil based paint: is hazardous waste and will not be collected. Call Bucks County Planning Commission **(215-345-3400)** for drop off locations and dates.

Leaf and Yard Waste Collection December 16 to March 31

Yard waste is collected the same day as trash and limited to five (5) containers. Cans may be used and plastic bags may be used only during this time.

APRIL 1 THROUGH DECEMBER 15

Unlimited yard waste will be collected and taken to a composting facility the day following collection of trash/recycling. Always use biodegradable, 30-gallon paper bags or trash containers that do not weigh more than 50 pounds when full. Yard waste in plastic bags will not be collected. Tree branches and shrubbery. must be no more than 36 inches long and less than 3 inches in diameter. They must be bundled and tied, taped or put in biodegradable bags. Branches or shrubbery cannot extend over the top of the can or bag. *Christmas Tree Collection:* Christmas Trees should be placed curbside the third week in January the day after your regular pick up, to be collected as yard waste and recycled. After that Christmas Trees will be collected as a bulk item.

Disposal of Bamboo

Bamboo is not accepted at our compost facility and must be disposed of with your regular trash. Bamboo cannot be disposed of with your yard waste. Please put the bamboo in plastic garbage bags or trash cans and put it to the curb on your regular trash collection day. Please remember, each household is limited to twelve (12) bags or cans of trash and your bamboo counts toward the twelve can limit.

Movable Street Basketball Hoops



Movable street basketball hoops are not allowed in the street and curb areas. Garbage trucks and snow plows inadvertently hit these objects when operating. Please remove all objects to the curb right of way or turn the basketball hoop so that the rim does not hang over the street where a truck bed can hit it. The operator's focus is on the task at hand and the curb; because of the size, weight, and noise of the truck; operators are often unaware that they have hit anything.



Not only does this damage the rim of the basketball hoop; it also does severe damage to the truck. The Township is not responsible when these items are hit.

MUNICIPAL AUTHORITY

Are Your Downspouts or Sump Pumps Connected to the Sanitary Sewer System?

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS REGARDING SEWER SYSTEM CONNECTIONS

O: WHAT IS A DOWNSPOUT?

A: A downspout is a pipe that is connected to the rain gutter of your home. The pipe may be improperly connected to your sanitary sewer service. When it rains or when the snow on your roof melts, the water travels down the gutters into the downspouts and finally into the sanitary sewer main in the street.

Q: WHY IS HAVING YOUR DOWNSPOUTS CONNECTED A PROBLEM?

A: Discharging rain water to a sanitary sewer through downspouts violates state and federal laws required by the Clean Water Act of 1977, and contributes to increased cost of stormwater that the Authority has to unnecessarily convey and treat each year. Stormwater from downspouts greatly contributes to this increased wastewater flow. Because the Authority system is not designed to handle this amount of flow, the wastewater is not treated properly and adds to the potential of discharging pollutants to the environment.

Q: HOW DO I DISCONNECT MY DOWNSPOUTS?

A: Disconnecting your downspouts is very easy and inexpensive. It can be done by disconnecting your rain gutter from the downspout and then connecting it to a downspout extension. A downspout extension can also provide water to landscaping that would not normally receive rain water due to overhangs. Downspout extensions can be purchased at any hardware or home and garden store.

Q: WHAT HAPPENS IF I DECIDE TO NOT DISCONNECT MY DOWNSPOUTS OR SUMP PUMPS?

A: Pursuant to Northampton Township Ordinance No 492, a violation is punishable by a fine of \$1,000.00 per day.

Q: WHAT IS THE REASON FOR REGULATION?

A: Wastewater is the discharge from toilets, sinks, showers, bathtubs, dishwashers and washing machines. People produce wastewater. It must be treated. Wastewater is removed through the sanitary sewer system. Sanitary sewers carry it to a treatment facility. Groundwater or storm water is water from rain or snow, which seeps into the soil. When soil becomes saturated, ground water seeps into basements. Sump pumps are commonly used to remove this water. Sump pumps must not be connected to sanitary sewers, but rather must be connected to a storm sewer or discharged onto lawns.

0: WHY?

A: When sump pumps or downspouts discharge into sanitary sewer, flooding often is the result. Sanitary sewers are not designed to handle the extra volume rain runoff and sump pumps add.

This extra volume overloads the design capacity of the system. Wastewater needs to be treated. Groundwater from sump pumps or downspouts does not. When the volume of wastewater is increased by the addition of groundwater from sump pumps, the Authority's and ultimately the home and business owners' treatment cost increase significantly and unnecessarily. On March 12, 2004, Northampton Township passed Ordinance No. 492, which prohibits sump pumps from being connected to sanitary sewers. A violation is punishable by a fine of \$1,000.00 per day.

Q: WHAT SHOULD I DO IF MY SUMP PUMP OR DOWNSPOUTS ARE CONNECTED TO THE SANITARY SEWER?

A: Reroute the pipe so that it discharges onto your lawn or into a nearby storm sewer. If you have questions, or need assistance or advice about how to bring your sump pump into compliance with the law, contact the Municipal Authority at 215-357-8515.

Q: IF I ASK FOR HELP, WILL I BE SUBJECT TO THE FINE?

A: No, as long as you take immediate steps to disconnect your sump pump or downspouts from the sanitary sewer. Our main mission is to eliminate those connections.

Q: ARE WE THE ONLY TOWNSHIP HAVING THIS PROBLEM?

A: No. All communities are dealing with the same issues. We are seeking your assistance in promoting environmental responsibility.

On March 12, 2004, Northampton Township passed Ordinance No. 492, which prohibits sump pumps and downspouts from being connected to sanitary sewers.

A History of Roads by James M. Briggs

We have been looking at how the expanding population in the 1950s impacted the local government in Northampton Township. The Township for the first time in its history consolidated all of its operations at a central location in Richboro. In future articles, we will examine various separate functions of government and how they were affected. But we will begin with one of the government's primary requirements since the Roman Times – the need for "improved" public roads.

Most people know William Penn established the counties of Southeastern Pennsylvania from a grant by the King of England in 1681. But there were scattered settlements along the Delaware River prior to Penn. The earliest road laid out in Bucks County circa 1677 enlarged an existing Native American path making it "passable for horses and carts". Portions of this road became Route 13 in the 20th century.

William Penn insisted that a proprietor (owner of the ground) from his land grant first compensate the Native American occupants before it was occupied. Penn formalized his own purchase in 1683 for lands between the Pennpack and Neshaminy Creeks. This area contained what would become the municipalities of Lower Bucks County with Northampton and Warwick Townships eventually along its northern borders.

Penn's property was first surveyed shortly after the King's grant in 1681 and the lands which would become Northampton Township had already been divided among 16 of his wealthiest friends. (See Holmes Map). Curiously the straight property lines closely equate to some of the major roads in the Township; Almshouse Road, Second Street Pike, and Bustleton Pike. Most of those first properties were never

settled and the proprietors would be viewed today as little more than land speculators.

The Northampton area was originally referred to as the "adjacents of Southampton" and next surveyed in 1703-1708. The number of proprietors had increased to over 30, but most were not original to the time of William Penn approximately 25 years earlier. There were some roads close to Northampton established by the 18th Century. Philadelphia Road (Second Street Pike) was officially started in 1693 and extended a few years later to Southampton. At roughly the same time the "Kings Road" in 1693 was built from what is currently Langhorne to Feasterville eventually becoming Bridgetown Pike. A portion of which is still the southern border for the Township.


During this period most local roads in this area were little more than farm lanes, and property owners could fence those areas at their choosing. Many of the land disputes were settled in Quarter Sessions Court and by 1709 some property owners from this area wrote a letter to the court. They complained that roads were cutting their properties into "narrow and irregular pieces". On December 11, 1722, 21 proprietors of the approximately 40 settlements asked to be "granted as a district Township to be called North Hampton." Permission was granted in five days and a Supervisor of Roads appointed in July 1723.

Many of these early roads are difficult to place because they had different names for various portions or changed names with adjacent property transfers. We know the road from Southampton was extended in the early 1700s through what is now Richboro, to Newtown, and ultimately Yardley. Bristol Road in 1724 was extended from the Holland area along the township Border, Bustleton Pike from Feasterville and Jacksonville Road from Warminster. So many roads were added the Township needed a second road supervisor in 1745. The upper portion of Second Street Pike called the "Middle Road" was chartered in 1753. This connected to Wrightstown Township on the first bridge in this area "Chain Bridge" started after 1748.

Early roads were established by simply laying out the location, clearing the trees, and removing stumps. This was acceptable for pedestrians or to travel on horseback. But this was inadequate for the increasing requirements of handling commerce on heavy wagons. By the early 1800's many of the roads were improved and maintained by private toll companies. Some of our local roads required tolls until Pennsylvania began assuming control of the major roads in the 1930s. There were still in the 1950s three old toll houses remaining in the area. My parents had a replica of an original toll schedule ranging from .24 cents for a wagon to .02 cents for a pedestrian and people going to church.

A comparison of maps from the 1800 era and a modern one from 1948 show general differences in the Township roadways. The newer map had "County" numbers for identification purposes and the farms were generally smaller because of mechanization advantages. Almshouse Road(called Poorhouse Road until the 1950s) originally did not continue straight into Richboro until cut through after 1812. The largest changes to the road system during this period were created by the construction of the Churchville Reservoir and the consolidation of farms due to the creation of the Tyler Estate(now the State Park).

The next article will continue the examination of the roads in Northampton as they were impacted by the technological changes of the 20th century. Much of the early history roads in the Township was compiled by Virginia B. Geyer to whom I am indebted.

If We Can't See Your House Numbers, We Can't Find Your House!

Message from Fire Chief, Adam M. Selisker

Have you checked the visibility of your address lately? Here's a test. Drive down your street and see how quickly you can see and read your street address. How about your neighbors? If you can't see it quickly, neither can emergency services. This could cause dangerous delays. Here are the address requirements as found in the Northampton Township Code These codes, as well as all other Township codes can be found on our website: www.northamptontownship.com

Remember, we can't help you if we can't find you!

§4-104. Numbering Requirements.

- 1. The owner, occupant or lessee of each and every structure which now fronts or which may hereafter front upon any public or private street or highway within the Township of Northampton who has been assigned a street number prior to the effective date of this Part shall, at his own expense, within 60 days after the effective date of this Part, cause the authorized and assigned number of such structure to be permanently and conspicuously placed in accordance with the specifications set forth herein. Any owner who has not been assigned a number prior to the effective date of this Part shall, within 60 days after notice of assignment of such number, comply with the requirements of this Section.
- 2. Specifications. Street numbers shall be: A. In Arabic numerals. B. A minimum height of 4 inches with a minimum stroke width of ½ inch, except as provided in subsection .3 of this Section. [Ord. 561] C. Placed upon a mailbox, post or other type of man-made fixture of substantial nature, excluding curbs at the vehicular entrance to the premises. D. Sufficiently legible as to contrasting background, arrangement, spacing and uniformity so as to be clearly visible from the street.
- 3. Placing Numbers on a Building. If the posting of the assigned building number under subsection .2 would not be feasible or practical, then regulations may be satisfied if the owner, occupant or lessee shall provide the Arabic numbers as required by these \$4-104 Township of Northampton \$4-105 4-4 regulations mounted in a secure fashion upon the front wall or porch of the building so as to be clearly visible from the street, at least 60 inches above ground level and so placed that trees, shrubs and other obstructions do not block the line of sight of the numbers from the street upon which the building fronts. When such a number is placed on a building, the minimum height of the Arabic numbers shall be 4 inches in height. [Ord. 561]
- Occupancy Permits. Any structure erected, repaired, altered or modified after the effective date of this Part shall have the occupancy permit withheld until the assigned street number is affixed to said structure in accordance with this Part. (Ord. 231, 9/25/1985; as amended by Ord. 561, 4/25/2012)

From The Office of the Fire Marshal

The Northampton Township office of the Fire Marshal Urges all residents who utilize wood burning appliances, or fireplaces to dispose of all ashes properly. Ashes from stoves, and fire places can remain hot and capable of igniting a fire for two weeks after removal from the stove or fireplace. Ashes should be placed in a metal container equipped with a lid, wetted, and stored outside away from your home or combustibles. Ashes should never be stored inside your home, or garage.

The Northampton Township Fire Department Needs your help. During the winter months we ask you to clear snow from your local fire hydrant. Adopt the plug closest to your home, and keep it clear of snow all winter long.

Can we find you? Township ordinances require that all assigned street numbers be displayed prominently on your home, or mailbox. Please make sure that your address is posted, and clearly visible from the street. We thank you for your cooperation.





Improvements to the Municipal Park Playground Scheduled to begin Fall 2020.

Since May 2005 on any given day of the year, even the coldest days, children have been seen happily playing on the playground at the Municipal Park on Hatboro and Bristol Roads in Churchville. Over the years, the Township has received compliments stating what a great playground it is. Well, its time for some improvements which will make it even better....for everyone!

Over the past few years the Miracle League of Northampton Township and the Northampton Township Administration have been working together to come up with a plan to expand the popular "blue" playground so that children of all abilities will be able to experience playing on a playground. Working with Landscape Structures, playground experts in Inclusive Play, the Miracle League Board of Directors has strategically selected pieces of equipment that will welcome children and families of all abilities to learn, play and grow together.

Playgrounds play an important role in the development of children. All children benefit from exploring the four defined areas of developmental skills when at play. The four areas of developmental skills are categorized into fours areas: sensory, motor, cognitive, and social/emotional. Multi-sensory experiences can be good because using more than one sense at a time helps to build the brain more quickly. However, those with disabilities may need to break that information into smaller parts. Some may require additional sensory input, others do better with less. Some may prefer to experience this input more frequently, others less frequently. That is why it is so important for playgrounds – especially inclusive playgrounds – to provide a variety of developmental options for children to choose from. The pieces of equipment selected for the Playground Improvement Project were chosen with this in mind.

In addition to new equipment, new surfacing, fencing and shade structures will be installed.

The improvements will be funded through grants, private donations and the fundraising efforts by the Miracle League organization. Donations can be made to support the purchase and installation of over 20 pieces of equipment ranging in price from \$1,000 to \$30,000.
