PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chairman Selisker led the Pledge of Allegiance and held a moment of silence in support of military and emergency services personnel.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There was none.

CONSENT ITEMS

MINUTES

The Board meeting minutes of February 23, 2022, were approved by unanimous consent.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

The accounts payable for March 9, 2022, for \$920,751.29 and, for March 23, 2022, for \$1,660,297.16 were approved by unanimous consent.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Authorize a Public Meeting to Consider Ordinance Amendment Adopting the 2018</u> <u>International Fire Code</u>

Mrs. Gasper stated a draft copy of the ordinance amendment adopting the 2018 International Fire Code was provided to the Board for review. Last month, the State updated the 2018 editions of the code concerning the Statewide Building Code (UCC). Those updates took effect automatically. The Fire Code, however, is not included in the UCC and therefore new editions need to be updated by ordinance.

Overall, the primary purpose of this ordinance is for consistency across all editions of the code that we enforce.

A motion was made and seconded (Gasper-Rose) to authorize the advertisement of a public meeting for Wednesday, April 27, 2022, at 7:00 PM at the Township Building to consider an ordinance adopting the 2018 International Fire Code.

Chairman Selisker called for public and Board comments. There was none.

Motion passed 5-0.

<u>Consider Resolution Authorizing Condemnation of Temporary Construction Easements to Install Sidewalks on Second Street Pike</u>

Mr. Moore explained that Northampton Township received a construction grant that will provide sidewalk connections along both sides of Second Street Pike over the Iron Works Creek. The grant award of \$893,417.00 was funded through the Federal Transportation Alternatives Set Aside (TASA) Program and is managed by Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC). The project upon completion will provide a continuous sidewalk connection from Tanyard Road to Crossroad Plaza. This project is part of our Master Development Plan for Richboro.

Most of the proposed work will be completed within the public right-of-way or Township property. However, two (2), Temporary Construction Easements are necessary to complete the project along the Tanner property on Second Street Pike and the KIMCO property with frontage on both Second Street and Bustleton Pikes. These Temporary Construction Easements are needed for grading/parking lot paving in front of the Tanner property and to connect to the existing sidewalk along the Crossroads Plaza. Once the project is complete, the sidewalks will be within the public road right-of-way, except where it matches the sidewalk in Crossroads Plaza.

After unsuccessful attempts to obtain these temporary construction easements from the property owners, it is the Administration's recommendation to condemn the area necessary temporarily so that the construction of the sidewalks can be completed.

A motion was made and seconded (Moore-Salzer) to adopt Resolution R-22-9 which authorizes the condemnation of a temporary construction easement across certain property located at 800 Bustleton Pike and identified as Tax Parcel ID# 31-015-023-004, which easement is necessary for the construction and installation of sidewalks along certain portions of Second Street Pike and to authorize the Township Manager and Township Solicitor to execute all documents and take all actions necessary to effectuate the purposes of this Resolution or otherwise required for this project.

A motion was made and seconded (Moore-Salzer) to adopt Resolution R-22-10 which authorizes the condemnation of a temporary construction easement across certain property located at 741 Second Street Pike and identified as Tax Parcel ID# 31-015-023-003-001, which easement is necessary for the construction and installation of sidewalks along certain portions of Second Street Pike and to authorize the Township Manager and Township Solicitor to execute all documents and take all actions necessary to effectuate the purposes of this Resolution or otherwise required for this project.

Chairman Selisker called for Board comment.

The Board unanimously agreed this action was necessary so the construction could start on the installation of the sidewalks. Not having sidewalks in this area was a safety issue. The extra benefit is the construction and installation of the sidewalks are at no cost to the businesses where they are being installed.

Chairman Selisker called for public comment. None was heard.

Motion Passed 5-0.

Chairman Selisker announced Mr. Pellegrino the Township Manager and Mr. Wert the Assistant Manager are absent tonight and Mr. Solomon is sitting in as acting Township Manager for tonight's meeting.

Consider Bids for Road Materials

Mr. Salzer stated on behalf of Bucks County Consortium, New Britain Township advertised for bids for bituminous asphalt materials and stone on February 4th and 8th, 2022.

The attached tabulation details the bid results for the materials we intend to purchase. A total of 7 companies submitted bids for various materials used in road maintenance and resurfacing.

The Department of Public Works recommends contract awards as follows:

- 1. **Asphalt Maintenance Solutions LLC, Center Valley, PA** Detack, Crackmaster 3405 Type II
- 2. **Eureka Stone Quarry Inc., Chalfont, PA** Screening, #2A Stone Mix, Super Pave 9.5 mm Wearing, Super Pave 12.5 mm Wearing, Super Pave 19.0 mm Wearing, Super Pave 25.0 mm Binder
- 3. **Hanson Aggregates BMC Inc., Newtown, PA** #1B 3/8" Stone, #1B ½" Stone, #2B ¾" Stone, #3A 1 ½" Stone, #4 Ballast Stone, #6S Stone (AS2 or AS4), R-4 Stone
- 4. Hei-way LLC, Sarver, PA QPR Cold Patch

The Township is expected to pave or micro-surface approximately 9 miles of its road system this year. The estimated cost for the materials under this bid is approximately \$1,376,741.

A motion was made and seconded (Salzer-Rose) to award contracts for various Bituminous Asphalt Mixtures, Stone, and Crack Sealing Materials to Asphalt Maintenance Solutions LLC, Center Valley, PA, Eureka Stone Quarry Inc., Chalfont, PA, Hanson Aggregates BMC Inc., Newtown, PA, and Hei-way, LLC, Sarver, PA, as recommended by the Public Works Department, at their bid prices to the Bucks County Consortium.

Chairman Selisker called for Board and public comment. None was heard.

Motion Passed 5-0.

- The Northampton Bucks County Sewer Authority is moving forward with its rehabilitation of infrastructure. This project is estimated to cost 3.8 million dollars. Approximately 16,000 linear feet of new pipe will be installed, along with 75 manholes. There will be no rate increase due to these improvements.

Mr. Moore made the following announcements:

- There is a lot of Land Development Activity happening throughout the Township. Spring Mill Townhomes, Waverly Sub-Division, and Stoneyford Subdivision to name a few.
- The Giant Supermarket is scheduled to open in June.

- Newtown Rail Trail will be holding a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Saturday, March 26, 2022, at 9:00 am. Northampton's 1st phase of the project will be starting this year.

Chairman Selisker made the following announcements:

- The construction of the new fire stations has started and the Holland Station has already been torn down. The construction of these two projects will take approximately 18-20 months.
- Tri-Hampton has sent out their annual Membership flyer. Donate to this great cause.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT

The Board has met in executive sessions two times. 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session and one of the matters that resulted in the action taken earlier this evening by the Board of Supervisors was the condemnation of the two (2) temporary construction easements.

The members of the Board, Mr. Michael Solomon, Acting Township Manager, the Township Engineer, and Mr. Pizzo himself were in attendance. A matter of potential litigation was discussed and no action was taken during the executive session and no official action was taken tonight as a result of the executive session.
