YARD WASTE COLLECTION REMINDER

Yard waste season in Northampton Township runs from April 1 through December 15. During this time, unlimited yard waste (including leaves and branches) will be collected by Whitetail Disposal on the day following your regular trash collection.

Yard Waste Requirements:

- Must be placed in biodegradable 30-gallon paper bags or sturdy containers
- Containers must weigh less than 50 lbs.
- No plastic bags permitted
- Branches must be tied and bundled (maximum 3 inches in diameter and 36 inches long)

The Northampton Township Parks & Recreation Department is proud to reflect on 2025 as a year filled with growth, creativity, and meaningful community connections. With a focus on creating memorable experiences and strengthening community traditions, this past year has marked an exciting chapter for both the department and residents of all ages.

2025 Highlights

In 2025, the Parks & Recreation team set an ambitious goal; to create engaging events that bring people together, while establishing traditions for families to look forward to year after year. Thanks to the dedication of staff, the continued support of the Board of Supervisors, Parks and Recreation Board, Youth Sports Organizations, local business sponsors, and an enthusiastic community, that goal was successfully achieved.

Our first big addition was the Sun & Fun Fest, a new summer kick-off celebration that drew an estimated 2,300 residents to the Civic Center basin for food trucks, live entertainment, and family fun. Throughout the summer, the revitalized Northampton Summer Nights Concert Series transformed Thursday evenings into a weekly destination, welcoming more than 6,000 attendees.

Fall brought a fresh take on a community favorite with the reimagined Halloween Happening, followed by the Township's first-ever Tree Lighting at our new Winterfest event, which welcomed approximately 2,100 residents to

celebrate the holiday season together.

While large community events were a highlight, 2025 also saw meaningful growth in programs designed to foster connection through shared interests. A key focus was the middle school population, with the introduction of "Tween Night Out", offering Friday night opportunities for middle schoolers to gather, enjoy pizza, and participate in sports, games, and creative activities.

The department also reintroduced its popular Red Cross Babysitting Course, giving young residents the opportunity to earn certification as a babysitter, build confidence, and develop valuable life skills. Group trips throughout the year provided additional opportunities for connection, including theater outings from New Hope to New York City, a visit to the Cape May Winery, and a holiday trip to Longwood Gardens. New art programs encouraged creativity in adults of all ages, with residents learning to crochet, knit, sew, and create cozy chunky blankets in a relaxed, social setting.

None of these accomplishments would have been possible without the collaboration and support of the Public Works Department, Northampton Township Police Department, Northampton Township Fire Department, Tri-Hampton EMS, Township leadership, and the many community partners and volunteers who help make these programs and events successful.

Looking Ahead to 2026

The momentum continues in 2026 with new programs, expanded offerings, and the return of signature events. Upcoming additions include year-round Musical Theater Programs for elementary-aged children and teens, continued growth of Tween Nights Out, and the return of award-winning summer camp programs, including Little Discoverers, which was successfully reintroduced in 2025.

Special events planning is already underway, with the Sun & Fun Fest scheduled for Friday, June 5, as part of a combined summer kickoff and celebration of America's 250th Birthday. Winterfest will return on Friday, December 4, featuring the annual tree lighting, food trucks, and holiday shopping. Additional programs include Puzzle Palooza on April 10 and a group outing to Bristol Riverside Theatre to see the musical Chess on Broadway on March 18.

With creativity, collaboration, and community at the heart of our mission, we look forward to another year of bringing people together and enhancing life in Northampton Township.



A Message from Public Works

PUBLIC WORKS ROAD TERMS - WHAT DO THEY MEAN?

Have you ever called your Public Works Department and complained about potholes, uneven pavement, or deteriorating road conditions, to have terminology such as that road is going to be milled, seal coated, cold-patched or paved?

Although these repairs set out to accomplish the same outcome, to make the roads in the Township drivable they are distinctively different in their approach to making this happen. When determining what repair is going to be done on a road, many factors are considered, such as what needs to be done to increase the longevity of the road before a full paving process needs to take place.

The maintenance of roads is nothing but the art of keeping the existing road in good working condition for the proper functioning of traffic. Road Maintenance plays an important role in the life span of roads and highways. Northampton Township encompasses approximately 26 square miles with over 170 miles of roadway that need to be maintained.

Below are the most common types of road maintenance.

Milling:

Milling is the process of removing the top layer of asphalt to a specified and even depth without disturbing the underlying subbase. This allows new asphalt to be laid down without increasing the height of the road and saves you time if the subbase doesn't need to be fixed. Milling asphalt is an environmentally friendly and very cost-effective way to repair asphalt.

Milling can also remove distresses from the surface, providing a better driving experience and/or longer roadway life. Some of the issues that milling can remove include:

- Raveling: aggregate (stone) becoming separated from the binder (oils and "tar" that make up asphalt) and loose on the road
- Bleeding: the binder coming up to the surface of the road
- Rutting: formation of low spots in the pavement along the direction of travel usually in the wheel path
- Shoving: a washboard-like effect transverse to the direction of travel
- Ride quality: uneven road surface such as swells, bumps, sags, or depressions
- Damage: resulting from accidents and/or fires

It can also be used to control or change the height of part or all of the road. This can be done to control heights and clearances of other road structures such as curb reveals, manhole and catch basin heights, shoulder and guardrail heights, and overhead clearances. It can also be done to change the slope or camber of the road or for grade adjustments which can help with drainage.

Nova Chip:

Nova Chip is also known as Ultra-Thin Bonded Wearing Course (UTBWC) and consists of a very thin, gap-graded hot mix asphalt layer placed over a polymer-modified emulsion membrane in single pass using a specialized spray paver. More simply stated, Nova Chip is a high-performance thin overlay that combines sealing and surfacing in one rapid operation. It improves surface texture, waterproofing, and ride quality while extending pavement life without requiring the thickness or cost of traditional overlays.

Seal Coating:

Seal Coating provides an extra layer or membrane on top of the asphalt roadway protecting and prolonging the life expectancy of asphalt pavement by filling surface damage and providing a protective layer to keep out damaging UV rays, vehicle fluids, and water and is very cost-effective. In Northampton Township, we have been utilizing a micro-sealing process which is like driveway sealant but is much thicker and can extend the life expectancy of the road by about ten years.

Cold Patching:

Cold patching asphalt is essentially what it sounds like, filling a pothole with gravel/asphalt material without heating it. It can be performed quickly in any season, but it's only a temporary repair until one of the options for permanent repair can take place. This is one of the only repairs which can be made in the winter season since hot asphalt can not be used unless it is 40 degrees and rising.

Paving:

An asphalt pavement consists of different asphalt layers. In general, the asphalt layers are paved on a bound or unbound road base layer. Starting at the road surface, the first layer is called the surface or wearing course. The second layer is mostly called the binder course. The lower layers are the base courses. Paving is what takes place when the layers in the

road need to be replaced and other options have been exhausted. Paving is the costliest out of all the solutions for repairing a roadway.

In the 2026 budget, we budgeted approximately \$207,000 for each mile of planned mill and paving, about \$190,000 per mile of Nova Chip, and about \$139,000 for each mile of planned micro-surfacing.

PUBLIC WORKS 2025 RECAP

Northampton Township's Public Works Department continues to protect and maintain the Township's extensive infrastructure, which includes 183 miles of roads, 97 miles of storm sewers, 257 acres of parkland, 18 buildings, and over 800 acres of open space. Much of this work is completed in-house to reduce costs and maximize efficiency.

Roads & Stormwater

In 2025, the Township improved 10 miles of roadway, with another 10 miles planned for 2026. A total of \$1.9 million was invested in paving, micro-surfacing, and nova chip treatment to extend road life. Public Works also repaired 49 storm inlets ahead of paving projects.

Parks & Recreation

The Department repaired 950 linear feet of paths at Municipal Park, with more improvements planned for 2026. Over the past three years, 355 new trees were planted across Township parks. Major recreation upgrades in 2025 included reconstruction of the roller hockey rink and two basketball courts, plus the addition of six new pickleball courts. Dembowski Memorial Park also received significant landscaping and safety improvements.

Facilities

Public Works conducts quarterly inspections of all Township buildings and maintains over 100 HVAC units and nine emergency generators. In 2025, key-fob access systems were upgraded or installed at multiple facilities, and interior renovations began at the Administration Building, including updates to the Public Meeting Room.

Fleet Maintenance

The Department services more than 320 pieces of equipment annually and performs state inspections on about 120 vehicles and trailers, supporting safe and reliable Township operations.

2026 PAVING PROJECT

Northampton Township's Public Works Department is pleased to announce the 2026 paving project, which includes a range of road improvement projects to enhance safety and driving conditions. Road maintenance typically occurs in August, although the exact timing varies depending on weather conditions and other Township maintenance projects.

This year's program features roads slated for milling and overlay, paving with nova-chip, and a surface treatment (typically micro surfacing) to extend pavement life and improve durability. These upgrades reflect our continued commitment to maintaining the township's infrastructure and ensuring smooth travel for residents and visitors alike.

When performing the milling and overlay, the top layer of asphalt is removed with a milling machine and then the full width of the road is repaved. The surface treatment is a heavy-duty sealer, similar to the material used on driveways but includes stone chips and is much more durable. Finally, the nova chip treatment is an ultra-thin virgin hot asphalt overlay which is used to preserve roads. The nova chip process allows for a road to be driven on immediately after compaction and does not require full width milling of the surface.

BLUE ENVELOPE PROGRAM



The Northampton Township Police Department participates in the Blue Envelope Program. This voluntary program fosters communication between officers and drivers on the Autism Spectrum Disorder and other conditions that may prevent communication during routine traffic stops.

Drivers participating in the program carry a Blue Envelope where they store their essential driving documents. The envelope also includes a contact card for a trusted person who can help, if needed. The outside of the envelope indicates if the driver is verbal or non-verbal and alerts the officer to sensory issues and how to best communicate. This information can reduce anxiety for the driver, promote patience and empathy from the officer, and lead to a positive interaction.

Blue Envelopes are available at no cost and can be acquired at Northampton Township Police Headquarters, at any time as our police station is open 24 hours a day.

- Keep your hands on the steering wheel until otherwise directed, even if the officer is not at your vehicle.
- The officer may shine a flashlight in your vehicle, may have a radio, and may have flashing lights on their vehicle.
- When the officer gets to your vehicle, let them know you have a blue envelope, answer the officer's questions, and ask the officer before moving any parts of your body.

PEDESTRIAN & CROSSWALK SAFETY

In Northampton Township, we have numerous crosswalks; this includes crosswalks in school zones that have a school crossing guard on duty. Over the next several months, you may see new crosswalks and some established crosswalks refreshed or improved. Here are some laws, safety tips, and a diagram that will help keep our community safe:

1. When a pedestrian crosses the street in a crosswalk, the driver must yield.
2. Pedestrians cannot walk or run suddenly or unexpectedly into the path of a moving vehicle.
3. It is illegal for drivers to pass a vehicle that is stopped for a pedestrian in a crosswalk.
4. When at a mid-block with no crosswalk, the pedestrian must yield to the vehicle.
5. When crossing the street at a signalized intersection, both pedestrians and motorists must obey the traffic-control devices.
6. When walking along a road with sidewalks, it is unlawful for a pedestrian to walk along or upon the roadway.


SAFETY TIPS FOR PEDESTRIANS

- Cross only at marked crosswalks.
- Remember to look left, right, and then left again.
- Do not cross between parked cars. Drivers will not see you until it's too late!
- Wait for a gap in traffic before crossing.
- See drivers and let drivers see you. Make eye contact!
- Wear bright clothes during the day and reflective materials (and a flashlight) at night.
- Watch for turning vehicles at intersections.
- Watch your children. Children have difficulty judging a vehicle's speed and distance.
- If you cross multiple lanes, make sure ALL vehicles see you and stop.
- If no sidewalks are available, walk as far on the side of the road as you can and walk against traffic.
- Be aware of your surroundings. (Eyes off your phone and on the street. Take off your earphones).
- You must dismount from your bicycle and walk it in the crosswalk. That is the law!

SAFETY TIPS FOR DRIVERS

- Slow down when approaching a crosswalk or intersection.
- Watch for pedestrians and yield to them.
- You must yield to pedestrians at both signalized and non-signalized crosswalks.
- Watch out for mid-block crosswalks.
- Expect the unexpected. At any time, children may dart out between cars.

If you have any questions about crosswalks, school zones, or anything related to the rules of the road, please feel free to ask any of our Police Officers when you see them or stop by our police station any time. Remember, our lobby is open 24 hours a day!

2025 Recap

2025 was a great year at your Free Library of Northampton Township! We hosted more than 166,000 visitors, an increase over 2024. We saw an increase of 6.7% in the circulation of our materials - more than 296,000 items borrowed by our community of users. We administered more than 220 proctored exams, provided 88 Book A Librarian sessions to assist people with their computer/device questions, and had more than 3,600 hours of community volunteer work, with almost 1,700 of those hours being performed by our teenagers! Our visitors' WiFi connections increased by 23% and we held 300 programs for adults with more than 4,600 attendees. Keep reading to see what we have in store for 2026!

The Township Archives, along with the Historical Commission, will be working with Public Works to install two markers at the Addisville Reformed Church and Feaster-Van Horn cemeteries, highlighting their histories. Information on the cemeteries will be included on the township's website.

On **Wednesday, November 11 | 1:00 to 4:00 PM**, the Archives will be hosting a Local History Day program with an open house of the Archives and a community scan event where people can share their photographs and documents and have them scanned. Historical Commission members will also be providing tours of the Addisville Reformed Church Cemetery and the Feaster-Van Horn Cemetery, highlighting the Revolutionary War veterans interred within them.

The cemeteries are planned to undergo a preservation project over the next few years.

Honoring 40+ Years of Service: Celebrating a Dedicated Volunteer

Carolyn Schmitz passed away on November 2, 2025. A longtime resident of Richboro, PA, she is survived by her son James Schmitz & his partner Camille, family friends Cindy Chen, Kevin Burd, and her siblings Joseph Wiley and Margaret Brenkert.

Carolyn volunteered at Free Library of Northampton Township for almost 50 years, beginning when it was at the old Nike military base. She worked the Circulation Desk on Monday nights. For more than 18 years, she served on the Library Board in several roles, most often as Treasurer.

Growing up in Indianapolis, she obtained a bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois and a master's degree from the University of California, Berkeley. Carolyn was a devoted educator and taught social studies at Springfield Township High School for 34 years. Numerous students remained in touch with her throughout the years and she valued their friendship.

In Remembrance: Celebrating the Life of Carolyn Schmitz

Carolyn co-created Springfield's World Cultures curriculum in 1967, which allowed her to share her love of travel. She delighted in visiting historical sites in Europe, Asia, Africa and the Americas, and traveled to India as a Fulbright Scholar (where she ignored the program's rules on luggage in order that she could bring an extra suitcase of books). In 1984, Carolyn and her son were nearly kidnapped in Dar Es Salaam, but the kidnappers' plan did not account for how ornery she was willing to be in public.

Lightning Safety

Thunder and lightning storms happen all the time. Know what to do to keep you and your family safe when storms strike!

Safety Tips

Indoor Safety

Turn off computers. Stay off corded phones, computers, and other things that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. You can use a cell or cordless phone.

Do not wash your hands, bathe, shower, do laundry, or wash dishes.

Outdoor Safety

- » If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance of lightning. Look for shelter inside a home, large building, or a hard-topped vehicle right away.
- » Do not go under trees for shelter. There is no place outside that is safe during a thunderstorm.
- » Wait at least 30 minutes after hearing the last clap of thunder before leaving your shelter.
- » Stay away from windows and doors. Stay off porches.
- » There is no safe place outside. Places with only a roof on sports fields, golf courses, and picnic areas are not safe during a lightning storm. Small sheds should not be used.
- » If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1. Get medical help right away.
