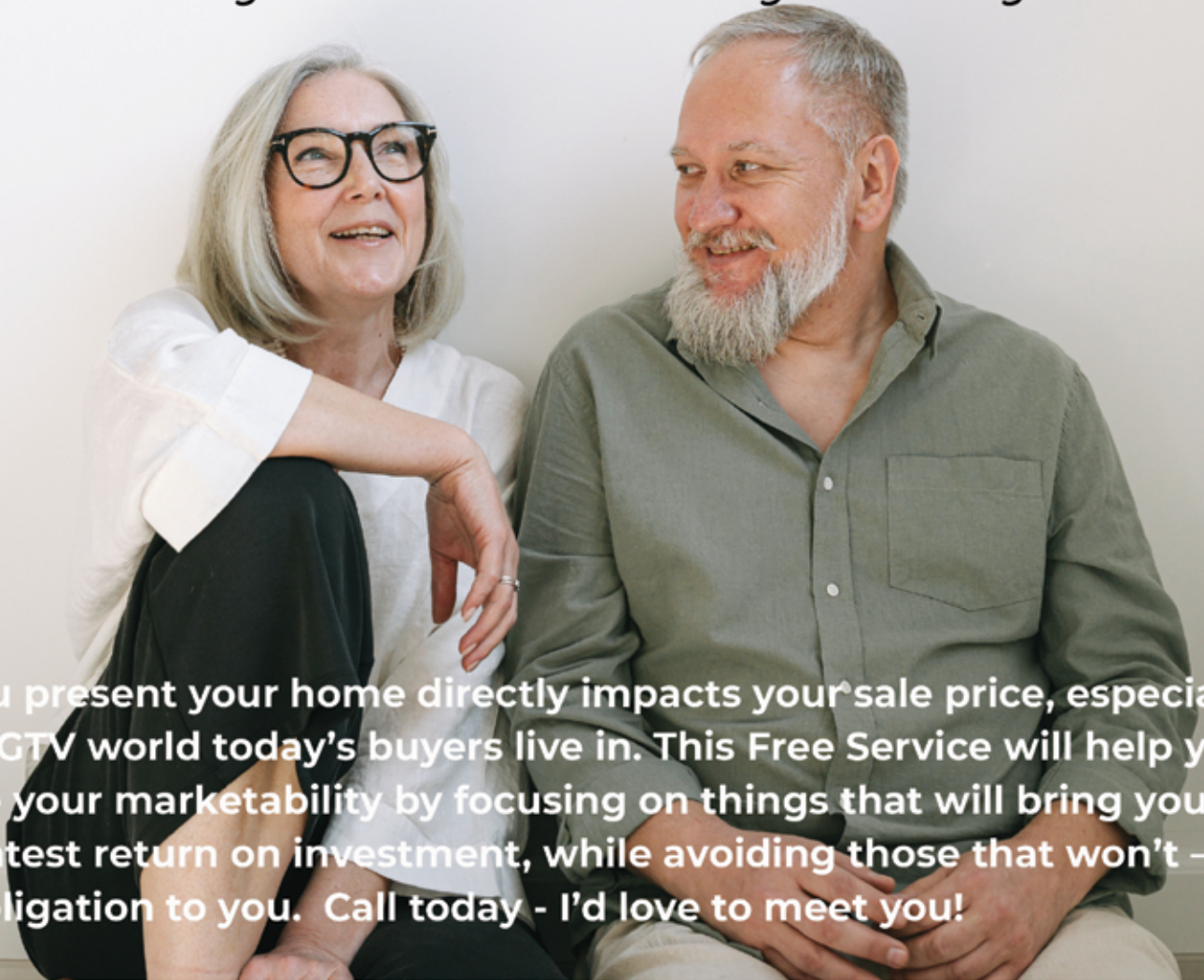


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Get Involved: Northampton Needs You On Our Advisory Boards

What is CIT? The Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) is an innovative first-responder model of police-based crisis intervention with behavioral healthcare, and advocacy partnerships. The CIT model was first developed in Memphis Tennessee in 1998 and has spread throughout the country. CIT is a jail diversion program designed to improve the outcomes of police interactions with individuals whose behavior is influenced by mental illness, substance use, developmental or intellectual disabilities, and related conditions. Officers learn to recognize psychiatric distress and other conditions and how to de-escalate a crisis — avoiding officer injuries, consumer deaths, and tragedy for the community. Research has proven that CIT training reduces arrests, the use of restraint, citizen and police officer injuries, hospitalization, and vastly improves the safety and satisfaction of all involved.



Northampton Township Police Department continues to support the goals of the CIT program – the primary goal being treating mental illness as a disease, not a crime. Lt. Charles Pinkerton serves as the Co-Chair of the 40-hour CIT training program along with Nicole Wolf from Lenape Valley Foundation. Corporal Dominic Dovidio also serves as a member of the training task force as an instructor in de-escalation techniques. Since 2007 the task force has trained 856 people in the Memphis Model CIT, 756 of those have been Bucks County law enforcement officers. Since the program's inception our department has been committed to its success and recognized the many ways it benefits and supports our community, especially those in crisis.

CHIEF LECOMPTE'S TRAFFIC SAFETY TIPS

The Truth & the Law About Turning Right on a Red Signal

Understanding the traffic laws goes hand in hand with following them. One of the most common questions we get is about "turning right on red".

Question: In Pennsylvania, can you turn right on red?

Answer: Yes, under certain circumstances:

- 1) You can turn right on red when there is no sign prohibiting it. It can be a sign that indicates "No Turn on Red" or a sign that prohibits turning right on red during certain times (for example, a sign prohibiting a right turn on red during an active school zone).
- 2) If you are at a red light and a right turn on red is not prohibited, you must still come to a **complete stop** and can make the turn **only when it is safe** (think about other vehicles and pedestrians).



Question: If there is a "No Turn on Red" sign, but road is clear of all other cars and pedestrians, can I turn if it is safe?

Answer: No. That sign indicates that it is never safe (or legal) to turn right on red at that location.

Question: If there is a sign that has a Right Turn Signal, can I turn right on red?

Answer: Yes. As long as there is not a corresponding "No Turn on Red" sign, the same rules regarding turning right on red will apply.

Smart Aleck

Question: Can I turn LEFT on red?

Answer: Believe it or not, YES, but only from a one-way street onto another one-way street.

On any other type of roadway or situation, you may not turn left on red.



E-BIKES IN PENNSYLVANIA: WHAT'S LEGAL & WHAT'S NOT

✓ LEGAL E-BIKES



A bike is legal in PA only if it meets ALL of these:

-  Has working pedals
-  Motor under 750 watts
-  Max assisted speed: 20 mph
-  Rider is 16+
-  Weighs 100 lbs or less

These are classified as "Pedalcycles with Electric Assist."

✗ NOT STREET LEGAL

Not allowed on roads:

-  ✗ E-dirt bikes
-  ✗ Electric or gas "mini-rides" with seats
-  ✗ Off-road-only bikes or scooters
-  ✗ Anything missing required equipment (lights, mirrors, brakes, etc.)

If it can't meet equipment standards, it's **NOT street legal.**

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A Message from Public Works

2026 PAVING & SURFACE TREATMENT PROGRAM

Starting Soon!

You may have noticed the Township preparing for the 2026 road program. Crews may perform advance work before surface treatments begin, including:

- Inlet and drainage repairs
- Crack sealing on selected roads
- Spot base repairs where needed

In 2026, the Township will use a combination of traditional resurfacing and modern preservation treatments, selected based on roadway condition, to improve ride quality and extend pavement life.

Treatments We Will Use

1) Mill & Pave (Full Resurfacing)

Best for roads in poorer condition that require more substantial renewal.

- Removes the top layer of existing asphalt (milling)
- Places a new asphalt surface (paving)
- Delivers the smoothest ride and longest service life
- Typical service life: 10–15+ years (depending on roadway conditions)

2) Cape Seal (Two-Step Preservation Treatment)

This year, instead of using micro-surfacing alone, the Township will perform a Cape Seal on selected roads.

What is a Cape Seal?

- Step 1: Chip seal (oil + stone) to seal cracks and create a flexible, waterproof layer
- Step 2: Slurry seal / micro-surfacing to provide a smooth finished surface

Why Cape Seal?

- Superior crack sealing: the chip seal layer helps prevent water from reaching the road base
- Enhanced durability: the chip seal layer can act as a stress-absorbing membrane to reduce reflective cracking
- Longer life cycle: typically 8–10 years (depending on road condition)
- Added strength: the stone aggregate provides reinforcement beyond a fine-aggregate surface alone
- More residential-friendly finish: smoother ride quality than a standard chip seal

3) Nova Chip (Ultra-Thin Bonded Wearing Course)

Nova Chip, also known as an Ultra-Thin Bonded Wearing Course, is a thin asphalt overlay system used on select roads that are structurally sound but showing surface wear.

How it works:

- Applied in one continuous pass with specialized equipment
- A bonding layer is sprayed immediately before the asphalt is placed
- Creates a strong bond between the existing pavement and the new wearing course

Why Nova Chip?

- Smooth, quiet ride similar to traditional paving
- Fast installation: roads can often reopen sooner than with full resurfacing
- Improves waterproofing and reduces surface deterioration
- Cost-effective way to preserve roads in good structural condition
- Typical service life: 7–10 years (depending on roadway conditions)

What Residents Should Expect

Please be prepared for short-term impacts while work is underway:

- Temporary delays and lane restrictions
- Brief driveway access interruptions during active placement (crews will assist when possible)
- Short-term parking restrictions on treated streets as needed
- Improved driving conditions after completion

• How do I report potholes for patching?

For **Township Roads**, please call (215) 355-3433 to report a pothole location. For any problem on the **State Highways**, please call **PennDOT** at (215) 345-6060, or **Submit a Concern** on their website: www.penndot.gov.

• Who do I contact to remove dead deer?

We are no longer allowed to pick up dead deer. Please call the Police Non-Emergency # (215) 357-8700 and they will refer the request to the PA Game Commission or PennDOT.

• Will you remove a tree that fell and is blocking the road?

If the tree belongs to the property owner, we will clear the roadway and place the tree limbs, debris, etc. on the owner's property. The property owner is responsible for contacting a landscaper to remove the tree debris from their property.

• What is the mowing schedule for the Township basins and open space properties?

We try to mow the 85 basins, 16 traffic islands, and the clear sight triangles on a 2 to 3-week turnaround schedule, however sometimes it is delayed due to the weather.

• How do I report a Street Light that is not working, or a Street Sign that is damaged?

Call (215) 355-3433 with the exact location of the Street Light and the Pole #, if applicable (this can be found on the Pole Tag). For damaged Traffic Signs/Street Signs, call (215) 355-3433 with the exact location of the sign.

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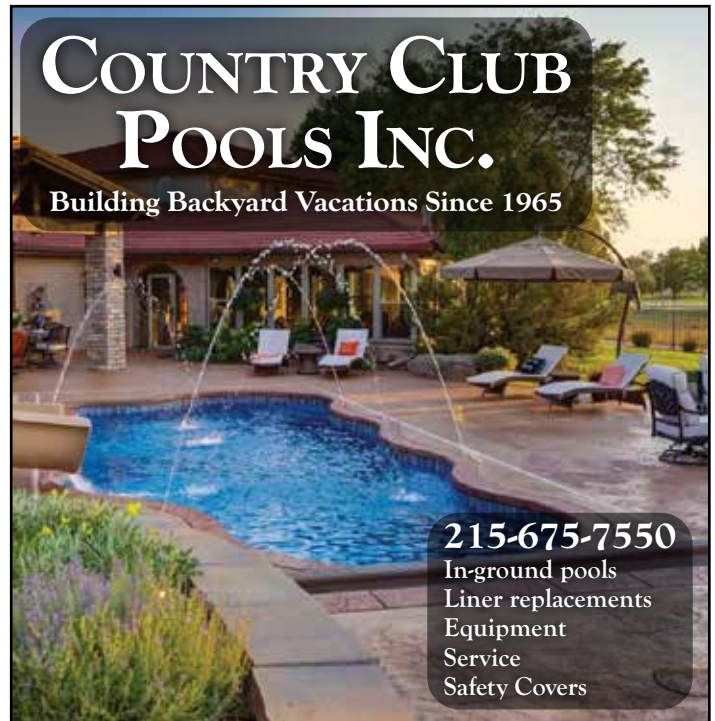
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NORTHAMPTON TOWNSHIP TRASH, RECYCLING & YARD WASTE GUIDE

"Keep This Guide for Future Use"

Northampton Township contracts with **Casella Waste Systems (formerly Whitetail Disposal)** to provide residential trash, recycling, bulk item, and yard waste collection services. Following these guidelines will help ensure safe, efficient collection and reduce missed pickups. For complete schedules and accepted materials, visit the online portal at <https://www.whitetaildisposal.com/municipality/northampton-township/> or call directly at 610-936-9967.

Automated Collection Areas

Most Northampton Township households are serviced by automated trash and recycling trucks. These trucks are operated by **one driver using mechanical arms** to lift and empty Township-issued carts.

Because the trucks operate using automated equipment, the driver **does not exit the vehicle** to move carts, remove items by hand, reposition containers, or pick up materials placed outside the cart.

Automated Collection Requirements

For collection to occur, the following requirements must be met:

- **All household trash must be placed inside the Township-issued trash cart.**
- **All recycling must be placed inside the Township-issued recycling cart.**
- **Nothing may be piled on top of the carts.**
- **No trash bags or loose items may be placed outside the trash cart.**
- **Cart lids must be closed.**
- **Materials may not exceed the height of the cart.**
- **Carts must be placed with at least three feet of clearance** from all objects, including:
 - Other carts
 - Vehicles
 - Mailboxes
 - Street signs
 - Utility poles
 - Debris or other items at the curb
- **Cart wheels should face the house so the cart can be properly emptied by the automated arm.**

If carts are not properly loaded and placed according to Township collection guidelines, the driver may be unable to service the property and collection may be skipped for that week. This is necessary for safety and to ensure the automated equipment can operate properly.

Township-Issued Carts

Northampton Township provides automated collection households with:

- **One 96-gallon trash cart**
- **Up to three recycling carts upon request**

Township-issued carts remain the property of Northampton Township and are assigned to the property. These carts **run with the property** and must remain at the residence if the property is sold or transferred.

Residents in automated collection areas must use Township-issued carts for regular trash and recycling collection.

Personal trash cans are **not permitted** in automated collection areas, except for approved yard waste use during the seasonal yard waste collection period.

Additional Trash Capacity

If you have more household trash than will fit inside your Township-issued trash cart, trash may not be placed outside the cart.

Residents who need additional trash capacity may lease one additional trash cart by calling the trash company at 610-936-9967. Trash placed outside the cart will not be collected.

Manual Collection Areas

Some neighborhoods, including certain townhome, condominium, and rear-load areas, cannot be serviced by automated trucks due to roadway width, parking conditions, building proximity, or limited truck access.

These areas receive **manual collection service**.

Residents in manual collection areas:

- Must provide their own trash containers.
- Must use containers that are durable and suitable for refuse collection.
- Should use containers no larger than **55 gallons**.
- Must ensure containers are manageable in weight.
- May not use recycling containers as trash containers.

Because manual collection requires sanitation workers to physically lift, move, and empty containers, normal wear and tear may occur during the collection process.

Container Responsibility Policy

Northampton Township has established clear guidelines regarding container ownership and responsibility.

Township-Issued Containers

Township-issued trash and recycling carts are maintained or

replaced by the Township or its contracted hauler when necessary through the Township's solid waste collection program.

Resident-Owned Containers

Resident-owned containers are the responsibility of the property owner.

The Township and its contracted waste hauler are **not responsible for the repair or replacement of personal containers** that become damaged during collection.

This applies to:

- Personal trash containers used in manual collection areas
- Personal containers used for yard waste .

Manual Collection Safety Procedures

For safety reasons, sanitation workers are not permitted to place their hands inside containers to remove refuse, wet leaves, compacted trash, or other stuck materials.

If materials such as wet leaves, grass clippings, compacted trash, or debris prevent the contents from emptying freely, sanitation workers may need to tap or shake the container in order to empty it.

The Township and its contracted hauler are not responsible for damage resulting from normal collection procedures.

The Township reserves the right to refuse collection from containers that are unsafe, excessively damaged, overweight, or unsuitable for collection.

Items Not Collected with Regular Trash

The following items are not collected as part of regular residential trash service:

- Hazardous waste, including radioactive, reactive, toxic, ignitable, corrosive, or acidic materials
- E-waste, including televisions and computers
- Construction and demolition debris, including concrete, roofing, remodeling debris, and similar materials
- Automotive parts or car seats removed from vehicles
- Materials placed outside the cart in automated collection areas

Residents should review the hauler's website for proper disposal options.

Set-Out and Removal Times

Because collection times may vary due to weather, road work, or operational needs, residents should always place items at the curb **after 6:00 PM** the evening before their scheduled collection day.

Containers must be removed from the curb **within 12 hours after collection**.

Early Collection, Weather Delays, and Service Updates

Trash and recycling collection generally follows a consistent schedule; however, there may be times throughout the year when trucks begin collection earlier than usual or when service is delayed or cancelled for safety reasons.

This may occur due to:

- Winter storms, icy road conditions, or severe weather
- Road paving or road repair projects

- Construction activity or temporary road closures
- Other conditions that may affect safe and efficient collection

Casella/Whitetail Disposal operates out of **Perkiomenville, Pennsylvania**, and weather or road conditions at their facility may differ from conditions in Northampton Township. In some cases, service may be delayed, cancelled, or adjusted based on conditions affecting the hauler's ability to safely operate.

Collection may also begin earlier than usual when road work, paving, or other scheduled operations are taking place so trash and recycling can be collected before those activities begin.

Residents should always place trash, recycling, bulk items, and yard waste at the curb **after 6:00 PM the evening before their scheduled collection day** to avoid missed collection due to early truck routes.

For service updates, delays, or cancellations, residents should check the Township website and sign up for E-News alerts:

Missed Collection vs. Improper Set-Out

If a cart or item is not collected, it may not be due to a missed stop.

In automated collection areas, collection may be skipped if:

- Trash is outside the cart.
- Items are piled on top of the cart.
- The lid cannot close.
- The cart is blocked by vehicles or other objects.
- The cart does not have three feet of clearance.
- The cart is facing the wrong direction.
- Yard waste is placed out improperly.
- Bulk items are not scheduled or are blocking access.

Yard Waste Collection

Yard waste collection rules change depending on the time of year.

April 1 through December 15

Unlimited yard waste collection runs from April 1 through December 15.

Yard waste is collected the day after your regular trash and recycling collection day.

During this period, residents may place out:

- Biodegradable 30-gallon paper yard waste bags
- Personal containers used for yard waste
- Properly bundled branches and shrubbery

Yard waste bags can be purchased at most home improvement, hardware, grocery, and retail stores.

Yard Waste Preparation Requirements

Yard waste must be prepared properly for collection.

Bags and Containers

- Use biodegradable 30-gallon paper yard waste bags or appropriate containers.
- Containers or bags must not weigh more than 50 pounds when full.
- Yard waste in plastic bags will not be collected.
- Branches or shrubbery may not extend over the top of the can or bag.

NORTHAMPTON TOWNSHIP TRASH, RECYCLING & YARD WASTE GUIDE

Branches and Shrubbery

Tree branches and shrubbery must be:

- No more than **36 inches long**
- Less than **3 inches in diameter**
- Bundled and tied, taped, or placed in biodegradable paper bags

Oversized branches, loose piles, logs, stumps, or improperly prepared yard waste will not be collected.

December 16 through March 31

During this period, composting facilities are closed and separate yard waste collection is not available.

Until April 1, yard waste must be:

- Placed inside your Township-issued trash cart if you are in an automated collection area.
- Mixed in with regular household trash.
- Contained within the cart with the lid closed.

A container with yard waste in the bottom and a trash bag placed on top is not considered mixed and may not be collected.

Yard waste placed in separate cans, paper yard waste bags, or loose piles will not be collected during this period.

Recycling Guidelines

Recyclables must be clean, dry, and placed loose inside the recycling cart.

Do not bag recyclables.

If recycling is contaminated or contains unacceptable items, it may be rejected.

Recycling carts may not be used as trash containers.

Cardboard

Cardboard is the only approved exception to the rule that all trash and recycling must be inside the cart.

Cardboard must be:

- Broken down
- Flattened
- Securely tied or taped together
- Placed in manageable bundles
- Limited to no more than five bundles

Loose or excessive cardboard may not be collected.

Bulk Items

Residents are permitted **one bulk item per week**.

Bulk items must be scheduled in advance by contacting Casella/Whitetail Disposal directly:

When scheduling a bulk item pickup, it is helpful to email a picture of the item so the hauler can confirm whether the item qualifies for collection and provide any additional instructions if needed.

Bulk items must be placed at the curb so they are accessible for collection and must not block trash carts, recycling carts, yard waste, mailboxes, vehicles, or other objects.

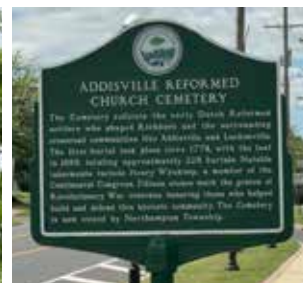
NORTHAMPTON TOWNSHIP ARCHIVES & HISTORICAL COMMISSION

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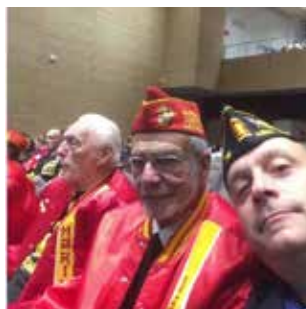
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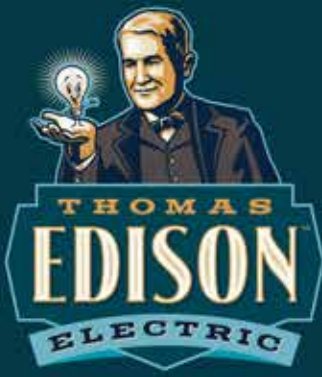
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TACKLING THE TRIPLE CHALLENGE: INFRASTRUCTURE, REGULATIONS, AND EMERGING CONTAMINANTS

Northampton Bucks County Municipal Authority (NBCMA) is facing the same triple challenge confronting water and wastewater utilities across the country: **emerging contaminants such as PFAS, an increasingly complex regulatory environment, and aging infrastructure that must be renewed for future generations.**

What makes NBCMA different is how it addresses these challenges together—through long-range planning, the aggressive pursuit of outside funding, and a commitment to protecting public health while keeping rates as stable as possible.

PROTECTING PUBLIC HEALTH: NBCMA'S PFAS RESPONSE

Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS)—often called “forever chemicals” because they break down very slowly in

the environment—have been detected in groundwater throughout our region. They are linked to historic military and industrial activities, including the use of firefighting foams.

NBCMA has been working for years to address PFAS in local drinking water supplies. **Key elements of the Authority's PFAS strategy include:**

- **Early testing and monitoring**
Before federal enforceable standards were finalized, NBCMA was proactively sampling its wells and tracking PFAS concentrations. This allowed the Authority to understand where contamination was present and to prioritize the most affected sources.
- **Taking compromised wells offline**
Where testing indicated PFAS levels of concern, NBCMA removed those wells from service or reduced their use—even before regulations required it. The goal was simple: to ensure that customers received water that met or exceeded the most protective standards under consideration.
- **Designing and constructing treatment facilities**
NBCMA moved forward with multi-phase capital projects to design advanced treatment systems at affected well sites. These projects include PFAS-removal technologies, sized and designed to meet stringent long-term limits, not just today's requirements.
- **Securing outside funding to protect ratepayers**
Recognizing that PFAS treatment is expensive, NBCMA aggressively pursued grants, low-interest loans, and responsible-party funding. This has included:
 - Cooperative agreements and funding from the U.S. Navy for contamination associated with historic military activities.
 - PENNVEST grants and low-interest loans to design and construct new treatment facilities and related infrastructure.



- Military Installation Remediation and Infrastructure Authority (MIRIA) and other state programs to support wellhead treatment, transmission improvements, and system resilience.
- Responsible-party contributions (Class Action Litigation), especially where contamination is linked to historic activities of federal or private entities.

By combining technical solutions with strategic financing solutions, NBCMA has been able to move quickly on PFAS remediation, inflow and infiltration abatement, and other significant infrastructure projects while minimizing the impact on customers.

KEEPING UP WITH REGULATIONS – AND PLANNING AHEAD

The regulatory landscape for drinking water and wastewater is more complex than ever, particularly around PFAS. New federal Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs) and state requirements are being layered onto existing Safe Drinking Water Act and Clean Water Act standards.

NBCMA's approach is to plan for where regulations are going, not just where they are today. That means:

- Designing to meet future limits rather than simply meeting the current minimums. Our treatment systems and operating plans are based on conservative targets so that future tightening of standards does not require a complete redesign.
- Maintaining robust sampling and data management, both for PFAS and for traditional water quality parameters. This supports regulatory reporting, informs operational and engineering decisions, and provides transparent information to customers and regulators.
- Investing in internal controls and federal compliance procedures for projects funded through state and federal programs. By maintaining strong documentation, procurement practices, and financial controls, NBCMA protects itself and its customers from audit outcomes, delays, or loss of funding.
- Staying actively engaged with state and industry organizations, such as the Pennsylvania Municipal Authorities Association. This helps NBCMA track evolving regulations, share best practices, and advocate for practical, affordable solutions for municipal systems.

In short, **the Authority is treating PFAS and related regulations as a long-term reality and building them into its overall planning, rather than reacting one rule at a time.**

RENEWING AGING INFRASTRUCTURE: PIPES, PUMPS, AND PLANTS

While PFAS has captured media headlines, NBCMA has not lost sight of the fundamental backbone of the system: hundreds of miles of underground pipe, pump stations, storage tanks, and treatment facilities—many of which were built decades ago.



NBCMA is addressing its aging infrastructure through:

- **Structured capital planning**

The Authority prepares and updates a multi-year Capital Improvement Plan that identifies priority projects, estimated costs, and funding strategies. This includes water main upgrades, storage tank rehabilitation, well upgrades, and wastewater collection system improvements.

- **Reducing inflow and infiltration (I&I) in the sewer system**

Groundwater and stormwater entering the sanitary sewer system can overload pump stations, lead to sanitary sewer overflows, and increase treatment costs. NBCMA has dedicated many projects and significant Authority and external funding—to locating and repairing leaking pipes, manholes, and service laterals.

- **Coordinating water main replacements with roadway work**

Whenever possible, NBCMA coordinates water main and service line replacements with municipal or PennDOT projects. This stretches capital dollars and minimizes disruption to residents and businesses.

- **Modernizing equipment and controls**

Investments in new pumps, generators, variable frequency drives, telemetry, GIS and SCADA systems help operators run the system more efficiently, respond faster to issues, and maintain more stable operation.

- **Inter-Municipal Agreement**

NBCMA aims to leverage existing regional infrastructure and surrounding municipal systems to obtain cost-effective water and sewer services while providing additional redundancy.

While the majority of ongoing infrastructure work is less visible, it is essential to reliable water and sewer service, fire protection, and regulatory compliance.

SMART FINANCING: LEVERAGING GRANTS AND LOW-INTEREST LOANS

Rebuilding infrastructure and installing advanced PFAS treatment would be impossible without a strong financial strategy. **NBCMA consistently integrates outside funding with responsible management of rate revenue.**

This includes:

- **PENNVEST grants and low-interest loans** to stretch local dollars and keep annual debt service manageable.

- **Grants and special state programs**, such as MIRIA, DCED Small Water & Sewer, LSA, and others, to offset the cost of individual projects.

- **Responsible-party contributions (Class Action Litigation)**, especially where contamination is linked to historic activities of federal or private entities.

- **Long-range financial planning** that looks beyond a single budget year and considers the lifecycle cost of facilities, future regulatory requirements, and the need to maintain reserves.



By stacking funding sources and planning ahead, NBCMA is able to move forward with PFAS treatment and infrastructure renewal without sudden spikes in customer bills. The Authority directed its consulting engineer to investigate all alternative construction methods to ensure that any cost savings achievable through state-of-the-art techniques were considered for every project. For example, directional drilling on several water main projects significantly reduced paving and restoration costs for water main extensions designed to address PFAS contamination in private wells. This approach allowed more properties to benefit from the Authority's available funding sources.

The Authority also utilizes Cured-in-Place Pipe (CIPP) to repair sewer lines and laterals, a practical and cost-effective option that avoids the need for complete sanitary sewer line replacement. This method provides structural restoration of pipes without the disruption and expense of excavation and full pipeline replacement.

- Seeking grants, low-interest loans, and responsible-party funding to protect ratepayers.
- Communicating openly with customers about projects, costs, and progress through multiple means of communication.

As regulations tighten and infrastructure ages, the challenges facing public water and wastewater systems will only grow. NBCMA's comprehensive, forward-looking approach ensures that our community not only meets these challenges but also stays ahead of them. Municipal authorities are not just responsible for running a water system—they are stewards of a community's long-term sustainability, affordability, and reliability of essential services. They provide stable, equitable, and responsive solutions that private companies simply cannot match. Local control fosters stronger community engagement, drives innovation, and strengthens economic stability—resulting in a level of service that makes municipal systems the clear and responsible choice for water and sewer services. 💧
